"The Black Watch" All-Talking McLaglen Romance, Is Splendid

JOHN FORD FAIRLY OUTDOES HIMSELF IN DIRECTION OF THRILLING SOLDIER-OF-FORTUNE TALE OF EASTERN INTRIGUE AND TEMPESTUOUS LOVE

Victor McLaglen leaped into stardom with his Captain Flagg of "What Price Glory?" and for that memorable performance must always expect to have his name coupled with that of the character, despite his sterling all-round qualities as an actor. But if Victor ever makes another picture as thoroughly satisfying as his current "The Black Watch" (incidentally, his first all-talker), then the public might very well forget his first success.

McLaglen's role in "The Black Watch," now at the Prince Edward, though a military one, is as different from the doughty, cussin' marine as "Journey's End" is from "What Price Glory?" as different as intrigue in India is from trench warfare.

In Myrna Loy, the bewitching, seductive and enigmatic figure of a superwoman, McLaglen has found a perfect foil for his aforementioned ability. The plot, then, revolves about the two with the glamorous background of Asia to heighten their love duel.

Briefly, the story concerns a British officer who accepts public disgrace to best serve the government intelligence. A man with such a love of country is pitted against a woman who aspires to be nothing less than empress and the only thing to frustrate their mutual ambitions is their desire for each other.

John Ford has made this into one of the most thrilling productions which ever came to Hollywood. And Fox Movietone may be forgiven any superlative adjectives they wish to

lavish upon it, for it is the perfect romance with just the proper amount of adventure and excitement and perfect emotion to make you become a part of the passing scene.

It is wholly a dialog and it may be mentioned here that the Movietone process again demonstrates its superior qualities. A fine supporting cast enunciates perfectly and not a syllable is lost. Mitchell Lewis, Lumsden Hare, David Rollins, Roy D'Arcy (a most successful villain) and many others in the cast are a treat to hear. There is also some very successful singing, a prayer song sung by Joseph Diskay, the tenor, and some other charming things by David Percy, the young baritone. Last but not least, there is a glorious bag-pipe band.

attracting back native sons from United States.

It was quite reasonable in years gone by that the Provincial Government should have hesitated in committing itself to such a policy owing to unstable conditions existing as a result of inadequate traffic facilities, and when so many young people were discouraged and leaving the Province, but with the improvements brought about in recent years and the anticipated further improvements, with the acquisition of a new Car Ferry, there seems to be no reasonable grounds for deferring for any longer period the establishment of a Colonization Department in Prince Edward Island. Such a Department should incorporate a Statistical and Publicity Bureau in order to proclaim our existence, resources and potentials. Our quality products, live stock and foxes have established a world-wide reputation, and now with a Canadian National Hotel in our Province, the eyes of the Continent will be focused on the Garden of the Gulf as never before, which will tend to not only boost our tourist business and bring many more people here to consume and buy our products, but will attract new capital and create new employment and prosperity in our midst.

Your Committee feel this is the dawn of a new era after years of struggle in Prince Edward Island, and we should visualize the future with optimism and be prepared to take advantage of our opportunities. During the year our Committee have been in communication with Officials of the Federal Immigration Department, the Soldier Settlement Board, and the Colonization Department of the Canadian National Railways. Your Committee consider they have done about all that could be expected in an endeavor to pave the way for our Provincial Government to act. Your Committee would urge the Board not to relax in its efforts in this matter of much vital importance to our Province.

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THE WEEK OF PRAYER

Last evening at the Baptist Church, the general theme was Church Unity, with particular attention to missions.

The minister of the Baptist Church, Rev. A. C. Vincent, presided. Rev. W. L. Outhouse led in prayer followed by Deacons Clark, Proud and Calbeck. Adjutant Martin read the Scripture lesson from John 1.

Rev. H. D. Raymond led the congregation in the general thanksgiving and the Apostles Creed. Rev. C. N. Brown delivered an effective, thoughtful address on missions. He spoke of the peace and importance of missions in Christianity—its part in the life of the Church, its origin in the person and nature of Jesus. Some of the obstacles to missionary success were mentioned. Selfish interest crowding out the vision of a world's need; our thinking in terms of dollars rather than souls; our allowing "the way" to become "a way."

The speaker thanked God for the consecrated volunteering for missionary service; for the unifying power of missions. He appealed for the sympathetic, prayerful, informed support of all Christians, to the Great Missionary plans of all Churches.

The music was led by the choir of the Baptist Church, with Miss Spencer at the organ. Very impressive was the anthem "Build thee more stately mansions, O my soul," with Mr. Dingwall taking the solo.

Rev. J. M. McLeod pronounced the benediction.

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
