There was a good supply of cod on sale at the usual price of 7 and 8 cents per pound and a small number of exceptionally fine looking fresh mackerel which sold at 35 and 40 cents each. Other commodities retailed at the following prices at the stalls: Eggs 55c dozen, butter 42 to 45c lb., wild ducks 90 cents each, wild geese \$1.50 each, corn 90c, onions, 10c dozen, cabbage 5c per head, turnips 3 and 4c each, squash 25 and 30c each, pumpkins 4c lb., Island pears \$2.00 per basket.

TO WORK IN SACKVILLE.—Mr. G. D. Ennis, contractor of bridge construction at Sackville, who has been in the city for several days looking for men to work at the bridge building work in progress there, left yesterday morning. He took with him about twenty men from Charlottetown secured through the service of the Employment Bureau in the Market Building. These men will be paid at the rate of \$4.50 per day.

HOME FROM FRANCE.—Among the latest arrivals home from overseas is Private Charles Larter, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Larter of this city, who got home a few days ago. Private Larter served in the 105th Battalion in 1916 with the original 105th Battalion and was one of those who transferred to the famous fighting 26th Battalion and participated in all the principal fighting in which the regiment took part up to the close of hostilities. Since that time he has been with the Canadian "Y" in France on work in connection with transferring the bodies of the Canadian soldiers who died in the trenches and battlefields to the vast cemeteries being set aside for that purpose. Good progress is being made on the work and many hundreds of bodies have been transferred but the work is necessarily slow and Mr. Larter thinks that it will take about four years before it can be finished. He brings back with him some very interesting views of the places he has visited in Germany and France and also scenes of battle. He left France six weeks ago and came out to Canada by the S. S. Araguay to Halifax. There was one other Islander on board named Kennedy who stopped over in Halifax.
