**GERMAN "FUNK HOLES."**  
 Men Who Engineered War Took No Risks.

The former headquarters of the Kaiser and his general staff is disclosing some extraordinary queer facts these days about the men who engineered the world war. Take, for one, Hindenburg, Germany's superman, around whom realms of poetry have been written, disclosing him as a fearless Napoleon leading his troops to victory. As a matter of fact, he spent a great deal of time in a wonderfully constructed "funk hole," or dugout, underneath the grounds of his villa here.

Spa, it may be noted, is almost on the German border and so far from where battle lines used to be that it was almost a day's journey in a fast motor car to get within sound of the big guns. The Kaiser, too, had similar hiding places at Neubeub, near a comic opera trench system about which he is said to have paraded for the benefit of motion pictures. At each of their villas there were delicate electrical instruments which would set up furious buzzing whenever an airplane approached anywhere near. At the first sound from this contrivance Hindenburg and the Kaiser used to run to shelter, it is reported. People who worked about Hindenburg's establishment said that he was continually running for cover.

Allied representatives on the International Armistice Commission are now occupying Hindenburg's headquarters, and they were amazed when they discovered this underground refuge of the great warrior.

The entrance was through the dining-room. From there a flight of steps led down to a tiled anteroom which, by the way, now serves as a very good pantry for the victors.

From the tiled room there was another flight of steps that led down to the real dugout. This was blocked by a huge iron door about one inch in thickness, which could be locked from the inside only. With it was fastened by a double bolt which would do credit to a Canadian banking establishment.

The dugout itself was luxuriously equipped. On the floor was a heavy flowered carpet and a Louis XV table and chairs added to the artistic arrangement. The walls, which were of corrugated iron, were painted white and the whole place brilliantly illuminated by electricity. On a little table was an electric fan to keep the marsh cool in summer, while an electric stove provided for heat in winter. The room was about 14 x 12 feet and was protected by four to six feet of earth above it.

The emperor's dugout was similar, except that it was much deeper under the ground and there were two entrances, one through the villa and the other from the grounds. The main entrance was from the house and led down a long flight of steps. Another touch to the pictures was added to this when a German resident of Aix-la-Chapelle told the correspondent of the Associated Press that the crown prince spent virtually all of his time in amusement.

**Big Whiskey Seizure At Stellarton N. S.**

Then the inspectors put in an appearance and made the seizure. The value is probably \$6,000 and it constitutes the biggest seizure ever made in that part of the Province.

**Trade With Bolsheviki 'Has Been Cut Off'**

**Martial Law For All Bavaria**

 PARIS, March, 2.—The Soldiers and Workmen Congress at Munich has declared martial law for all of Bavaria, according to a Zurich despatch to the Matin. The Congress has assumed supreme power as a provisional national council exercising legislative functions.

**G. W. V. A. Demands Surrender of 50,000 Defaulters**

 REGINA, March 1.—The Great War Veterans at their regular meeting last night passed a motion asking the Dominion Government to demand the surrender of 50,000 defaulters in Canada and that they be disfranchised for a period of ten years in addition to suffering the present penalties provided for by law.

**PRELIMINARY PEACE NECESSARY AT ONCE.**

LONDON, March, 2.—The Paris correspondent of the London News stated today that the Economic Council has reported to the Supreme War Council that a preliminary peace must be concluded at once with Germany or the blockade raised. The recommendation it was said, was based on the report of fourteen British officers revealing the seriousness of the situation in the Central Powers.

**CANADIAN BOOTS MAY FIND MARKET**

Opening in This Line for Canadian Trade in Europe.

OTTAWA, Feb. 28.—The Canadian Trade Commission has been asked in a cable from the Canadian Mission in London to secure information from boot manufacturers in the Dominion as to their production, facilities for delivery, and approximate prices in cheaper grades of boots for men, women and children. The cable also requests approximate prices and deliveries in pulp, newspaper, and leather.

There is obviously an opening in these lines for Canadian trade in Europe, and as the Canadian Trade Commission in Ottawa has been established to facilitate this reconstructive work and to secure all the trade possible for the Dominion, it would be advisable for manufacturers and merchants to keep in close touch with the Commission.

**Flu Causes 3,046 Deaths In England**

LONDON, Feb. 28.—Deaths from influenza increased at an alarming rate last week, according to the official figures issued today. The total number of deaths from this cause in 96 great towns of England and Wales was 3,046, as compared with 1,363 in the preceding week.

In greater London the number of deaths was 974, compared with 451 the previous week.

**Graceful Tribute To General Pau**

OTTAWA, March 1.—A broad smile on General Pau's face, when he took his seat by the side of the speaker in the Canadian House of Commons yesterday afternoon, indicated that he had in the debate proceeding unwittingly stumbled upon an old legislative acquaintance. The heroic French commander entered the chamber as J. A. E. Ethier, of The Mountains was speaking. Cries of "Vive la France" with prolonged cheers, greeted him. Mr. Ethier who had been speaking in English resumed his speech in French. This tribute to the nationality of the distinguished visitor being acknowledged by further cheering. The member at the time had been arraigning the prohibition order in council. He did not change his subject but sought to give it a touch of the "Entente Cordiale." He paid a graceful compliment to "one of the gloriously wounded in 1870." "Is it fitting," Mr. Ethier then demanded the French speaking members laughing the while. "Is it fitting that at this time we should annul the commercial treaty concluded between France and Canada at the time of the Entente Cordiale, is it fitting that at the present time the importation of French wines should be stopped or even curtailed?"

**ANOTHER REVOLUTION IMMINENT IN GERMANY**

LONDON, March, 2.—A further revolutionary movement in Germany is imminent, according to a report reaching London through Holland. It is added that Chancellor Scheideman has resigned.

**Armenia Makes Known Its Claims**

PARIS, Feb. 28.—The claims of Armenia, as placed before the Supreme Council at its meeting yesterday, were as follows:  
 "First—Liberation from the Turkish yoke.  
 "Second—The formation of a new Armenian state to be made up of the six Armenian provinces of Turkey, and the territories of the Armenian republic in the Caucasus, and also the port of Alexandretta, which already is claimed by Syria.  
 "Third—Protection for twenty years by a great power under a mandate from the League of Nations."

**Saving Deposits In Canadian Banks**

OTTAWA, Feb. 28.—Unemployment has not so far made any serious drain on savings deposits in Canadian banks. They continue to increase. In September, 1918, before the last war loan was placed on the market, savings deposits reached the high water level of \$1,039,500,000. Payment of war loan subscriptions brought the total down, but it is now again climbing towards the billion dollar mark.

During January there was an increase of 31,500,000, bringing the total at the end of the month to \$990,000,000. During the whole war period from August, 1914, to January, 1919, savings deposits increased about fifty per cent.

Bank returns for January also show a decrease in demand deposits; a decrease in deposits outside Canada and a decrease in call loans both in and outside Canada.

**DUKE OF DEVONSHIRE ATTENDS SOLDIERS BANQUET.**

TORONTO, Feb. 27.—It was significant of the deep love and high esteem in which Toronto fighters are held not only by the citizens but by the world at large that at last night's banquet in the armouries when more than 3,000 soldiers and their friends were entertained the board was graced by such distinguished personages as the personal representatives of His Majesty King George V. His Excellency the Duke of Devonshire, Governor General of Canada, and of the great republic of France, General Paul Pau.

The Duke of Devonshire said "It is a high privilege to have the honor of being with you tonight and to share in the welcome that the citizens of Toronto are giving to our sons who have done so nobly and bravely for us. I may say to you men who have just come back from overseas that while you have so bravely upheld the name of Canada in France you have not been forgotten at home. I have travelled across the dominion from Halifax to Victoria and have seen something of the spirit of those you have left behind you. You have reason to be proud of them. They have stood by you and done their best. The women were a source of inspiration to all. I am fortunate and honored in sharing this celebration with the distinguished French officer, General Pau (cheers). General Pau has seen the spirit of Canada in France and he sees the spirit of Toronto here tonight.

Perhaps it has been given to no visitor from another country to receive the greeting that was accorded General Pau as he stepped upon the platform and faced that huge gathering of men and women. His stocky figure in its blue uniform with the right sleeve hanging, handless at his side, surmounted by a head with high brow, ruddy complexion, twinkling eyes, white moustache and goatee, brought swift recollection of another equally distinguished little man who visited Canada some years ago and who passed away ere the tides of victory swept the Allies and his own beloved British Tommies forward to complete the downfall of the Hun, the late Field Marshal Lord Roberts.
