

Navy And Welshmen Play To 3-All Draw

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Goal With Less Than Two Minutes To Go Gives 'Tars' Even Break

A goal from the stick of Ted Bradley with only a minute and 56 seconds of playing time left last night gave the Navy hockey squad a 3-all draw with Prince of Wales Welshmen in a City Hockey League encounter and enabled the Tars to draw up to within two points of the second place Legionaires.

Featured by close checking throughout the game wound up in a blazing finish after the Navy had shot the equalizing tally with the last drama packed 86 seconds as they heaved out rubber from all angles as the game broke into a wide-open struggle.

Navy had to come from behind twice in the nip and tuck encounter to earn their split in points. They yielded two goals in the first two minutes of the first period to the still winless Welshmen; they roared from behind in the second session to knot the count at 2-all; early in the third they saw Welshmen go ahead again on Beer's sharp shot from 20 feet out and with the final seconds ticking off it appeared as if the College team were headed for their first victory.

But Navy with four forwards on the ice and after coming within inches of goals on two previous occasions in fact scored the goal that equalized to add another point to their total.

Scoring during the game was pretty well divided with Mike Hennessey leaving his Navy defence position long enough to fire home his team's first two goals in each instance. Beer was Bradley. Goal-getters for the Welshmen were Douglas, Robertson and Beer.

Springing right to the attack from the opening whistle Welshmen went into a two-goal lead in the first 129 seconds of play. 26 seconds from the start Robertson wheeled around the Navy defence, passed to Douglas parked in front of the net. Beer fired a low drive into the twines. Keeping up their offensive Welshmen clicked for their second goal at 2:00. Breaking from behind his own blue line Beer scored to tie the game.

Waging a continuous offensive from the start of the middle session the "Tars" with two widely separated goals got back on even terms with the Welshmen before the period ended. Coming close on a couple of occasions as they hemmed the Welshmen inside their own blue line, Navy realized at 3:56, Mike Hennessey sliding the disc in between a maze of legs after Kelly had passed to Blanchard, and the latter relayed it out to Hennessey.

Both teams were having plenty of chances, but it was Davis who kicked out three drives in a row from the edge of the goal crease. A penalty to Kelly halted the Navy offensive but Welshmen

could not break through as Navy kept king the disc. With both teams at full strength and time rapidly running out, Navy finally got the equalizer on a nearly identical play as their first counter. Higonson got possession in the centre zone. Forced over to the left boards after crossing the line he slid a forward to Flannigan, the latter's passout landing on Hennessey's stick and Mike again beat Proude with an ankle high drive from thirty feet out.

Checking each other closely neither team had a real scoring chance in the first minute but at 1:24 Beer sent the Welshmen's hopes soaring when after taking Douglas's pass he faked a shot at the defence, skated a couple of strides and then blazed a shoulder high snaphot behind Davis.

For the next 18 minutes play raged up and down the ice with both goalies proving unbeatable. Twice Navy were short-handed with penalties to Higonson and Peppin and it was while the latter stood off that Davis really stood in the breach to thwart the Welshmen's efforts. Four times in a row they were in on top of the smothered goal-labeled drives. At full strength Navy forced Proude to be good but Welshmen were hanging on grimly.

Time was running out on the Navy. Twice they had what looked like goals only the red light failed to flash and the fans were starting to leave their seats when Proude backhanded the equalizer home with Higonson and Kelly drawing assists on the play that started from a faceoff at the side of the Welshmen's net.

For the final minute the crowd were kept standing as the game burst wide open but the two goalies refused to have their honour dented.

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Leafs And Canadiens Battle To 1-All Draw

MONTREAL, Jan. 16 (CP)—Toronto Maple Leafs and Montreal Canadiens battled to a 1-1 stalemate here tonight in a rough house fixture that saw referee Frank (King) Clancy hand out 20 minor penalties as a capacity throng of 12,066 customers were kept in an uproar throughout.

The top two teams in the National Hockey League race fought tooth and nail as they threw body checks about with abandon. It was the second meeting between the arch rivals in two nights and the draw left the second-place Canadiens still nine points behind the league's leading Leafs.

Toronto went ahead on a goal by Norman (Bud) Poole after the game was only two minutes and thirty seconds old and the aggressive Torontoians held their slim advantage until 6:37 of the final frame when utility forward Bobby Pilon evened it up on a backhanded marker.

Pilon's goal was a heartbreaker for Turk Broda as the pudgy Toronto goalie had played a sensational game to hold Canucks at bay while his mates were short-handed several times during the blistering contest.

Despite the heavy penalty list, the game was never in danger of getting out of hand as Clancy kept close tab on all minor infractions. Toronto took 11 of the penalties to Montreal's nine. Rookie Howie Meeker was the main offender.

Drillon Sees Team in Senior Hockey Next Season

 CHARLOTTETOWN, Jan. 17 (CP)—One mild day in a vision of the future, Gordie Drillon, Toronto Maple Leaf rightwinger, who had just won the National Hockey League scoring championship and the Lady Byng trophy, was seen in conversation with a photographer who inquired about his plans for the next season.

The result of the cameraman's artistry was a picture of a clean-shaven, shifty young athlete with an almost angelic expression and a stretch of the imagination slightly—a halo around his head.

For Gordie Drillon, Montreal, N. B. gift to hockey, was a perfect example of the clean hockey player who incurs few penalties and seldom loses his temper.

That was why Drillon's oldtime supporters were a little worried when they read that he had earned 10 minutes in penalties during two games for the Canadian Legion team in the Charlottetown Hockey League.

"He's a gentleman Gordie turned 'em man," they asked?
 "The answer is an emphatic 'No!'" Drillon said in an interview today that his puck personality hasn't changed a bit.

He explains his familiarity with the penalty box by saying "I'm just trying to look after myself."
 Gordie, who coaches as well as plays, is 210 pounds and provides a bulky target for ambitious body-checking defencemen.

And Drillon doesn't like being body-checked any more than any other player. Besides, he believes it is far more blessed to give than receive. So he's definitely not a "bad man," just adapting himself to the style of play in the league and the penalties follow in natural sequence.

There's another question. Has he slowed up much since his N. H. L. days?
 Drillon admits he has, but still claims to have the eagle eye that carried him to the top in the N. H. L.

He points to one particular game with a Charlottetown All-Star team last year when he scored 11 goals against O'Leary, P. E. I.
 "The game was arranged to raise \$250 for the O'Leary team could pay for the rink."
 He still loves his hockey as much as ever, he signed his 38th major league contract on Saturday, as coach of the Pittsburgh Pirates, and therein lies an interesting story.

When the Flying Dutchman signed his first contract in professional baseball, with St. Louis, Mo., in 1895, he was paid \$36 a month. Later, of course, the veteran received as much as \$10,000 a season, and that in the days when ten grand was the equal of \$40,000 today.

Wagner, who will be 73 years of age next month, quit playing in 1917, but even if he had not been coaching all these years, his name would never be forgotten in baseball if only because of one story. When \$10,000 was regarded as the ultimate baseball salary, Wagner refused a contract that size, saying that \$7,500 was all he was worth, and that probably drew so much attention to the honest and capable Dutchman that a bigger contract became inevitable.
