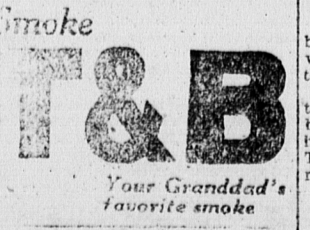

LOT 5.—Heifer Calf 6 months old. Her dam is Cow in Lot 1 above. This is a beautiful, large type daughter of prize winning parents.

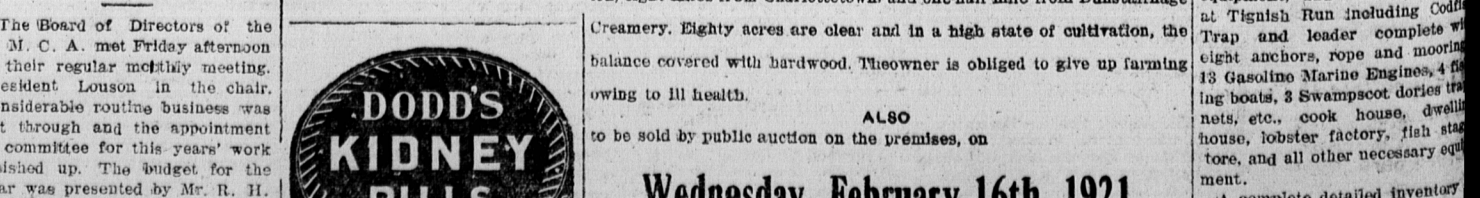
