THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)
MONTREAL, Feb. 22.—On the pro-
duce and dairy market here last week
prices of eggs, cheese and potatoes
were higher while butter quotations
were lower. Yesterday prices were un-
changed. Eastern townships and west-
ern number 1 pasteurized butter
were quoted at 32 cents a pound and
retailers sold for 34 cents and
wholesalers 35 cents a pound. Last week's
receipts were 5,458 boxes of which
40 boxes were Australian butter.
Retail prices of British Columbia and
Ontario fresh eggs were extra 32
cents, 28 to 29 cents and second
21 to 22 cents a dozen. Western
practices extras were quoted at 31
cents, firsts at 27 cents and seconds
20 cents a dozen. Storage firsts,
carlots were at 18 to 19 cents and
seconds at 16 to 17 cents a dozen.
Quotations to retailers were un-
changed. Receipts for the week were
241 cases. On the cheese market,
white was quoted at 12 cents
and colored at 14 3/4 to 15 cents a
pound. Summer cheese was 15 1/2 to
20 cents a pound. Receipts last
week were 712 boxes. New Brun-
swick green mountain potatoes in car-
lots were 75 cents per 100 pounds, bulk
to retailers 85 cents per 80
pounds bag.
