**Aircraft Carrier Back From Training Cruise**

HALIFAX, May 14 (CP)—The Canadian aircraft carrier Warrior, arrived here today and anchored in midstream after a month-long training cruise which included tactical exercises with the Royal Navy's American and West Indies Squadron. She was accompanied by the destroyer Nootka which also took part in the exercises.

An hour earlier Seafire and Firefly aircraft which had taken off from the carrier's decks, flew over the city and landed at Eastern Passage Airport, across the harbor.

**Value Of Building Permits Increases**

OTTAWA, May 16—(CP)—Total value of building permits issued by 204 municipalities making monthly returns to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics showed a decided increase in every province except Prince Edward Island in 1946, the Bureau said today.

Total value was \$383,596,696, an increase of \$186,406,538 over 1945. New construction accounted for \$306,142,420, and additions, alterations and repairs for \$77,454,276.

Permits for residential or home-building construction increased \$82,802,476 to \$200,691,307 and commercial building advanced \$77,170,962 to \$100,265,361. Industrial building was valued at \$34,761,623, an increase of \$22,869,914; institutional at \$23,663,825, a rise of \$2,121,369; and sundry jobs at \$4,214,562 a gain of \$1,444,797.

Ontario municipalities reported the highest value of building permits with \$160,520,167 compared with \$80,053,564 in 1945. Quebec increased to \$111,815,328 from \$50,256,668; British Columbia to \$42,803,377 from \$24,671,703; Alberta to \$29,738,950, a 71.5 per cent gain; Saskatchewan to \$18,014,947, an increase of 142 per cent; Manitoba to \$16,300,341 a 48 per cent rise. In the Maritimes, New Brunswick gained 282 per cent to \$6,437,553; Nova Scotia gained 81 per cent to \$7,442,787; and Prince Edward Island sank 25 per cent to \$451,250.

Values of building permits for residential construction by provinces in 1946 was as follows (figures for 1945 bracketed): P.E.I., \$94,350 (\$83,320); Nova Scotia, \$4,192,600 (\$2,534,512); New Brunswick, \$3,372,353 (\$740,382); Quebec, \$42,328,131 (\$27,376,929); Ontario, \$77,170,962 (\$41,734,003); Manitoba, \$10,320,776 (\$6,352,903); Saskatchewan, \$11,619,902 (\$4,511,194); Alberta, \$18,612,875 (\$14,473,115); British Columbia, \$26,479,094 (\$18,200,521).
