SHOCKING STORY  
DOUBLE MURDER

TORONTO, Oct. 1.—A story of a shocking murder received today from Alberta, states that H. E. Hewitt and Edward Cole, two prominent ranchers residing near Cochrane, were fatally stabbed yesterday by a gang of drunken Italians. Cole was so ripped in pieces that his vital organs were exposed, while Hewitt was found with two inches of a heavy dagger embedded in his spine.
