**Committee Meetings**

The student body was divided into three groups for the afternoon session. Members of the Supervisory Committee and Treasurer spent the afternoon in the Credit Union model audit under the direction of Mr. J. G. Dennis, Inspector of Credit Unions.

Members of the Credit Committee and members of the Board of Directors discussed the problems of credit union work under the leadership of Prof. MacDonald and Dr. Croteau. Prof. MacDonald lectured on "The Credit Union National Association and Its Services" to the three committees at the concluding afternoon session.

**Prof. A. B. MacDonald**

Prof. MacDonald addressed the evening meeting on the subject, "The Meaning of the Credit Union." The speaker first examined the weaknesses of old systems of credit and contrasted them with the scientific control of credit in the credit union.

The credit union, according to Prof. MacDonald, has brought credit facilities and opportunities for saving together, which is as it should be. Borrowing and saving should be convenient.

The speaker asserted that the selling of an article must be divorced from the act of credit. Each is a distinct transaction and great confusion arises when the two are joined. Great abuses have come out of installment buying, Prof. MacDonald stated. The cost of credit should be clearly and distinctly stated as an element in the consumer's choice. This is exactly what the government is doing in many of the regulations of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board. But this is a temporary measure, as well as a wartime need. The government's action has shown the waste of the old system, running their own credit unions take the mystery out of financing, Prof. MacDonald said. By analyzing the transactions that come up regularly in the credit union, the intricacies of finance become commonplace operation. The credit union has demonstrated

**Brother of Local Man Is Killed In Maine**

PORTLAND, Me., Nov. 24—(AP)—Three charges of murder were lodged today against Pte. Charles Adkins, 23, of Emporia, Va., in last night's waterfront slaying of two other negro soldier guards and white civilian, and arraignment was continued to Friday at the request of County Attorney Albert Knudsen.

A Springfield rifle bullet which killed Nelson Hawkins, 65, a foreman at the Portland Gas Light Company's plant, went through the pelvis of William Dyer, about 50, another gas company worker, who was in critical condition at a Portland hospital.

The negro victims were Ptes. George Chambers of Rocky Mount, N.C., and Edward Murray of New York City.

(The Mr. Hawkins referred to above is a brother of Mr. John Hawkins, an employee of the Patriot Publishing Company of Charlottetown. Mr. Hawkins was informed of his brother's tragic death here today.)

(The late Mr. Hawkins was a native of Charlottetown. He went to the United States more than 40 years ago and has not been back here since. He was at Portland for about 40 years. His brother, John, is the only member of the family now in this Province. Others are away.)

(Much sympathy is extended to Mr. Hawkins in his brother's untimely death.)
