Attended Royalty On Previous Visits

QUEBEC, Jan. 1.—(CP)—When Britain's King and Queen open their Canadian tour next May at this old city, at least one police official here won't be flustered by the "fuss and feathers" attending reception of English Royalty. Captain Emile Trudel, 72-year-old consultant chief of Quebec City Police, says he does not know if he will be called upon to play any official part in the greeting ceremonial, but already he has received several requests—"a few from across the line"—for information on the "do's and don'ts."

after 35 years as police chief four times was charged with local preparations to receive Edward. He met also the late George V, who attended Quebec's 1908 Tercentenary celebrations as Prince of Wales, and the Duke of Connaught brother of Edward VII and Canada's only Governor-General of Royal blood. Captain Trudel remembers, too, which the present King visited Quebec as a youngster, but he treasures most of all his memories of time spent in the company of the young prince who later was to abdicate the throne he held as Edward VIII. Innumerable are the chief's anecdotes dealing with Edward's "personal touch"—Edward's "cognitive" stroll about Quebec's ancient streets. More than once he saw evidence of the Prince's celebrated "personal touch"—Edward's quick smile of recognition and impulsive dash forward to grasp the chief's hand, he recalls, afforded something of a shock to the for-

mal-minded personages and brisk military guard on hand to greet Wales and the Duke of Kent when they stepped down a battleship gangplank in 1927. "I remember his well-restrained curiosity, too," he says, "when the prince noticed I was wearing a jeweled tie-pin on which was mounted the Prince of Wales' plume. Several times I caught him glancing at the pin, but then he'd look quickly away—but he laughed heartily and admitted he had been a 'little curious' after I explained his father had presented it to me here in 1908." Chief Trudel still wears the pin. In 1931, Captain Trudel "repaid" Edward's 1927 visit. After attending the Paris World's Police Conference of which he was then vice-president, he went to London and an impromptu interview at St. James Palace was arranged through Inspector Parker of Scotland Yard, and Sir Godfrey Thomas, Edward's personal secretary.

In Memoriam

MR. JOHN M. MacDONALD

The death of Mr. John M. MacDonald, a highly respected citizen took place at his late residence Nine Mile Creek on October 31, 1938. Born at Nine Mile Creek the son of the late John and Julia MacDonald, he lived with his parents the early part of his life. At the age of eighteen he left his native Province and took up his residence at Bangor, Maine. Two years later he moved to New Bedford, Mass., where for twenty years he was engaged in the carriage business of John T. Brownell.

At the end of this period he returned to Nine Mile Creek where he purchased a farm and carried on a successful business. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church in Canada and enjoyed the comfort of the Christian religion. Just prior to his death he joined in the singing of the hymn "The Hour of My Departure's Come."

The funeral services at the home and graves were conducted by the Rev. G. Carlie, Minister of Zion Presbyterian Church, Charlottetown, assisted by the Rev. E. R. Woodside of Corner Brook. The hymns sung were the twenty-third Psalm, the fifty-third paraphrase and the third Hymn.

There are left to mourn his loss, his wife (nee) Louise I. MacNeill, two sons, Howard E. and Neil Wilfred and one daughter (Muriel L.) Mrs. G. W. Murphy. He is survived also by surviving the sisters and brothers: Mrs. Ben Barr, New Bedford, Mass.; Mrs. Samuel Gregory, Charlottetown; Mrs. Joseph Mitchell of New Dominion; Mrs. Douglas MacEachern, Rice Point; Malcolm of Nine Mile Creek and Hector of Providence, P. I. The pall bearers were: Charles MacDougall, Peter Currie, Norman MacDougall, Neil McQuarrie, Allan MacDougall and Michael Murphy. Interment was made in Canoe Cove Cemetery.

Dominican Brother Seriously Burned

QUEBEC, Jan. 2.—(CP)—Brother Martin of the Dominican Order was critically injured tonight from burns suffered in a New Year's night fire which swept through the Roman Catholic Order's monastery adjoining St. Dominic's Church.

Rescued with another Brother from the flaming dormitory of the three-story, brick building, Brother Martin was burned seriously when his night clothes became ignited. Brother Hyacinthe was burned about the face, arms and legs but his condition tonight was not regarded as serious.

Brother Martin, in agony from the burns, was rushed to the monastery's front lawn and rolled in the deep snow to extinguish the flames in his clothing.

Other occupants of the building, including a number of Dominican priests as well as brothers, escaped unharmed.
