Representative made a few remarks. Mrs. (Prof.) McLarty sang much to the pleasure of the audience. "Do as you listen." Those present hope to have the pleasure of hearing her again in future. Prof. McLarty spoke a few words of appreciation of the work the Institute was doing and made a strong plea with the people of the district to have the McDonald Consolidated School opened in the near future. Mr. Weeks told of the benefits to be derived from such occasions when Farmers and Professional men met together for Mutual benefit and although a professional man himself thought if called on could make as good a job of farming as most farmers present, some of us preferred to take Mrs. McLarty's advice, "Dean, you listen." A Duet by Mrs. W. J. McEachern and Het Richards followed. Mr. Bert Brown of York spoke briefly but the hour being late did not say all the audience would have wished. Mr. Wilfred Kennedy and Mr. Ludlow Jenkins also made a few remarks. After which the meeting closed by singing the National Anthem.

know there was a war going on. If it were merely left to the sacrifices that we are called on to make while Britain and her Allies are making the greatest sacrifice that nations can make, shutting down many of their industries, and changing others to war-producing factories, causing untold suffering and hardship to many; while the countries and shores of Europe are being invaded and ruthless damage being done on sea, depriving wives and families of bread

earnings and making hundreds and thousands widows and orphans; there they know what war is; there the generosity of rich and poor alike is unshaken. While what have we to show for the blessings we enjoy in a land virtually flowing with milk and honey; where the war has brought untold prosperity and practically wiped out unemployment and the consequent ill-effects therefrom? True, there are a few who feel the effects, such as laborers and the small farmers who have to buy at the higher prices, and who have little but their labour to give in exchange. These people are feeling to some extent the pinch—especially since the beginning of the year—but I do not know that it is that class who refuse to give, according to their means, to the Patriotic Funds. There are others who have lots for sale and little to buy, and those I see with one dollar and less after their names, when it ought to be five or ten, and they would not miss it even if it were twenty-five or fifty dollars. I know some will not like this, but I think most will admit that what I say is true. I hope I have not intentionally trod on the toes of anyone; I would not have trespassed on your space had it not been suggested that we farmers were doing the best we could for this Fund, especially the Roadmasters, who, as a rule are in a position to give at least \$2 per head without feeling that they sacrificed one day's meal.
