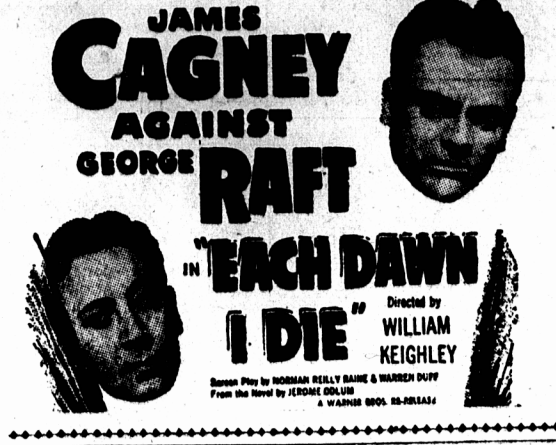

Mr. MacIntyre was a former resident of Montague for many years before leaving for Western Canada. He is a charter member of the local curling club, and was the skip of the Island team that took part in the Dominion playdowns in 19—.

On Thursday night a meeting was held in the Grade XI classroom for the purpose of organizing the Montague baseball club. The meeting was largely attended, and a team selected to enter the Southern King's League which was organized on Thursday night.

Already the team has had two practices preparing for the opening game on Monday night. Early next week work will begin on the new diamond to be located at the north end of the Community Welfare League grounds. It is understood that a bulldozer will be used to skin-off the top, after which the ground will be harrowed, raked and then rolled hard. A new high backstop will be erected, and possibly players boxes. The Montague team which will play on Monday night comprises: Catcher and captain, Ernie Carver; pitcher, M. G. A special meeting of citizens of the Montague School district was held on Wednesday with Mr. A.T. Sullivan acting as chairman, for the purpose of considering the construction of a two-room annex on the south side of the present six-room school. After considerable discussion on the feasibility of constructing a room in the basement, it was decided that the two-room annex should be built, and the sum of \$12,000 was voted for its construction. Some years ago the six-room school had provided ample space for all classes, but during the past eight years the number of school children attending increased to such an extent that morning classes were held for one grade, and afternoon classes for another. Last year the situation became so acute that Grade XI had to move to other quarters in order to make room for expansion of the lower classes. As yet this expansion has not been carried out to a sufficient degree, necessitating another expansion this year.

As a consequence the Board feels that only two rooms will handle the difficulty. With an eight-room school Montague will now be in a position to offer educational facilities to many who do not belong to the district. It is understood that the Board is seriously contemplating adding many trade courses to the curriculum, including music, carpentry, mechanics, painting and sculpturing, and home economics. Should this program be carried out students will have a greater incentive to attend school so as to finish their education. It is also the hope of the Board that this new annex may be built that it may be opened to form a large auditorium for community purposes. With an eye to the future, and the development of the community and the educational facilities of the children, the Board has made no mistake in a very necessary undertaking.

Building moving is nothing new. Last week while eating dinner this writer was surprised to see a mighty bulldozer going in Morell road with a long warehouse towing behind getting along at a smart speed, several men kept pace to see everything was in order. A few hours later the same machine came back to the village with a bungalow in tow the property of Mr. and Mrs. Mauric Martell.
