PARLIAMENT PROROGUED

As stated in The Guardian's dispatches yesterday morning parliament was prorogued on Saturday afternoon to meet again in January next, if nothing happens to prevent such meeting.

"If nothing happens," ah, there's the rub! So many things "happened" since parliament had last met, so many things nearly "happened" while it was in session! "Who can tell if ever more shall meet those mutual eyes?" or words to that effect.

There has been a sort of death-bed solemnity about the meeting and the parting of this session, a sort of uncertainty as to the outcome, which made the proceedings pathetically humorous or humorously pathetic. As the sick man the outcome of whose illness is doubtful, makes what preparation he can to square himself with the Unseen and the Unknown, so the late session has made every preparation to meet the inevitable, be it immediately or soon, for, even at best, the time is short. Never for a moment in all its deliberations did the government lift its eyes from contemplation of that bourne from which so many politicians never return, the general election.

Some twenty-six or seven railway lines were projected, money in millions was appropriated for these, one or two or more in every province, except Prince Edward Island which is only a little place any way and which naturally was forgotten, notwithstanding the fact that it was solidly represented.

Notes By The Way

Parliament was prorogued on Saturday afternoon. The session began on February 28 and the announcement was made by the Prime Minister that it will be called to meet again in January next—six months hence—unless something transpires in the meantime to prevent that "something" will be understood to mean a general election. The significant statement added by the Premier that he had been unable to give a pledge that there would be no general election in the interval implies that he had been asked by his followers to give such a pledge. He has left them and the country as well in doubt upon the one question which is of prime importance in political affairs. It seems probable that the Cabinet has not yet agreed, or is perhaps unable to agree as to the course to be pursued. The uncertainty left in the public mind by the oracular statement of the Premier cannot fail to have an unfavorable effect upon the industrial and commercial interests of the country.

It is rather amazing to read in His Excellency's prorogation speech the incredible statement that "the national budget has been balanced. The words were read by the Governor General as in duty bound, as they were prepared for him by his constitutional advisers. Neither he nor the great body of the Canadian electorate can be made to believe that the Dominion is paying its way while yearly adding to the national debt.

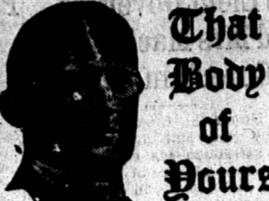
During the session the Senate amended some bills and rejected others that had passed through the Commons as it had the constitutional right to do and in that way materially curtailed the lavish expenditure proposed by the government. For this the Premier has launched a parting threat at the Red Chamber. He will at the next session, he says, "seek to establish the rights of the House of Commons over the Senate." This involves an important constitutional change for which the government has as yet no mandate from the country. An authority which may be difficult to obtain and can only be gained by an appeal to the people.

The two oldest Senators in Canada are Hon. G. G. King and Hon. John Yeo. The first named is 87 years of age and the latter some what his senior. It speaks well for our vigorous maritime stock that of the 96 Honorable Gentlemen who are entitled to sit in the Red Chamber the two of most advanced years should come, one from New Brunswick and the other from Prince Edward Island. As Senators are appointed for life they mostly prefer to hold on to their seats until their demise or inability to attend the sessions intervenes. Even this inability does not disqualify if it does not extend beyond one year.

Ottawa hears a rumour that Hon. Mr. King would like to retire from the Senate, as he finds the long journey to Ottawa and the long seasons there have become wearisome, and on the strength of this rumour a number of applications are said to be already made for the seat to be made vacant. It is perhaps natural that there should be many aspirants for these positions, which are among the most lucious plums the gift of the government and it is quite the usual thing for the more eager and ambitious ones to file these applications early.

Both the veteran senator referred to are firm supporters of the party in power and while there has been as yet no intimation that Senator Yeo desires to give place to a successor. Yet in Opposition circles at the capital both these gentlemen are credited with a common desire to know in advance who will be appointed to succeed them. Opposition gossip attributes to Senator King a strong desire that the senatorship which he holds shall remain "in the family." But this is, of course just the sort of rumor that would be set afloat by rival applicants for the seat.

You have grown tired of everything in the way of food. You can't understand it, because you have worked out a system whereby you get just the right number of calories every day for your particular body, and for the amount of work you do. You eat so much of the different kinds of food proteins (meats and eggs) carbohydrates (bread and vegetables) and fats (milk and butter) with water and salts.

What's the matter? Well, you've forgotten something that is absolutely essential to the enjoyment of food, and the proper digestion of it. What is that? Your appetite.

And after all it is your imagination, the sight, the smell of food, the clean attractive dishes and table cloth, that stirs within your brain a keen desire for food which we call appetite.

Did you enjoy the last particle of the last fowl as much as the first day? You know you didn't. Why? Because the brain did not stir up the appetite to stimulate the mouth and stomach juices to the same extent.

Why? Because you saw the food so often that your imagination was not stimulated. You had less appetite and less juices.

So if you get a little tired of food,—and your work doesn't boget an appetite, simply change your diet.

Why Bible Remains Best Selling Book

"THERE are four great reasons why the Bible is the best selling book in the world," said James Wood, 84-year-old president emeritus of the American Bible Society when interviewed recently in his home in Westchester County. "First to satisfy an innate longing. People want something outside of themselves and know it can be found in the Bible; second, a spiritual experience urges them on to verify it through the Bible. A step higher are those who want to confirm doctrinal beliefs, and this is not necessarily through a controversial impetus; and last, that class highest up and most in number, those who want to know what is in the Bible that has made the people who read it superior to other people. This last is the most tremendous factor in its sale," says the Brooklyn Eagle.

It is recognized that English-speaking people rule the world, and everybody else wants to know the reason why. It was a known fact that in the ten years before the World War the English-speaking people increased 216 per cent, while no other language reached a 100 per cent. increase.

Great Demand in China

To-day the Republic of China has more Bibles published and circulated in its territory than any other country in the world. Last year two and one-half million volumes were distributed in China, and twice as many could have been circulated if the earthquake had not cut off the supply. It is their keen interest in western ideas.

"Do you think people buy the Bible just for literary purposes?" Mr. Wood was asked, and he replied: "Very few. Only the highly educated are attracted because of its literary merit. The rest of the world get it because they are looking for something they cannot find, which they feel might be found in the Bible."

Bayreuth is the great printing center for Bibles in the language of Egypt, Arabia and Syria. Tokio is the centre for Japanese, Siamese, Korean and the Philippine languages. The rest of Asia, outside of China, is supplied by the British and Foreign Bible Society. The printing is done in England, where one can get a better Bible for the money than any other place in the world.
