Notes on the P. E. Island Egg Laying Contest for the 29th Week Ending May 22, 1926.

Mr. Harry Hyde's pen No. 12 of Barred Rocks lead the contest for the week with 58.9 points (51 eggs), the Experimental Station's pen of W. L. No. 1 was second with 55.1 points (55 eggs); Mrs. F. Halliday's pen of B. R. is third with 52.5 points (48 eggs). Mr. Everett Howatt's pen of W. L. No. 5 leads the contest to date with 1066.4 points, 1021 eggs. Mr. Harold Laird's pen of B. R. No. 14 is second with 1028.3 points (997 eggs). The Experimental Station pen of W. L. No. 1 is third with 1015.5 points (1166 eggs). Mr. Talmage Foster's pen of B. R. No. 16 is fourth with 1014.6 points (1193 eggs). Experimental Station pen of W. L. No. 4, is fifth with 950 points (1116 eggs). Mr. George P. Connor's pen of W. L. No. 6, is sixth with 944.1 points and 1114 eggs.

Hen No. 7, pen 11, owned by Mr. Clifford McEwen, leads the contest to date with 153 points (162 eggs) and passed Mr. Harold Laird's No. 3, pen 13, which is now second with 152.4 points (132 eggs). The Experimental Station hen No. 7, pen 15, is third with 146.9 points (1603 eggs).

The production for the week was 872 and to date 18045. The production for the same week last year was 908 and the total to that date was 18,866.

K. Of P. Chancellor's Radio Address

The following address was broadcast from C F C Y on Thursday night by Mr. J. Arnold Mowry, of St. John, Grand Chancellor, Knights of Pythias, Maritime Provinces Division.

Ladies and Gentlemen: In speaking for the first time to a PCFCY audience, I wish to assure you that I fully appreciate the high privilege extended to me by the Island Radio Company, in giving me this opportunity of saying a few words on the air to my friends who may be listening in tonight at various points in Prince Edward Island and elsewhere within the reach of my voice.

Perhaps no more appropriate subject could be chosen by a P. E. Islander in introducing himself to a PCFCY audience, than that of Prince Edward Island itself, as this would form a ground of common interest between speaker and listeners, thus making us all feel the more at home.

University Graduates Prominent Society Will Be Given Another Chance

(Canadian Press) HALIFAX, N. S., May 28.—The twenty-one graduates of Mount Allison, Dalhousie and St. Francis Xavier Universities who failed to pass the minimum professional qualifications examinations to admit them to the Provincial Normal College short course will have another chance, according to an agreement reached today between the principal, Dr. David Solon and the Nova Scotia Council of Public Instruction, which is the executive Council of the Government. The intermediary was Dr. A. H. McKay, Supt. of Education who was in Ottawa when the situation arose and returned yesterday.

The students who, fresh from universities, failed to qualify for the three weeks teachers course at Truro, will be allowed to study the course at their homes and take the examinations at the end of July, and if they are then successful they will have lost nothing except the value of having studied the subjects involved under direct instruction of professors and teachers.

The candidates who failed claimed that the examinations had been unfair in that they had not been warned of the subjects upon which they would be called to write.

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, May 28.—Harry Acton, 38, was arrested here today charged with being a member of a gang in a \$5,000,000 State-wide stock fraud and swindle. Paul Sarazen of Buffalo, was arrested on a similar charge recently.

According to Deputy Attorney General Fred E. Lewis, Acton was an head of the Home Deposit Company, and worked throughout the State with fifteen subordinates, several of them being pretty women. He regarded Acton's arrest as very important.
