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Note Of Caution Evident In Stock Market Dealings

NEW YORK, March 4—(AP)—The stock market remained stuck fast today in the grip of traders' caution.
Price changes were mostly fractional and gains and losses almost evenly divided.
Turnover amounted to only 730,000 shares, a step above yesterday's 600,000 (the second lowest figure of the year) but still nothing for business-starved brokers to get excited about.
Prices were marked down a bit over a wide front during the first hour and stayed there until late in the session.
Several issues responded to news specifically affecting them. American Petroleum, for instance, jumped 4 1/8 to 95 3/4 after a report that the company made what might be an important oil discovery in New Mexico.

At Toronto
TORONTO, March 4—(CP)—Western oils staged a last minute rally to recover many early losses on the Toronto Stock Exchange today.
Calgary and Edmonton added 10 cents to \$4.70 and Anglo-Canadian recovered 20 cents of an early 25-cent decline. Okalta was ahead five cents while Royalite dipped a like amount.
Mining issues slipped slightly on narrow losses. Losses tripled gains in base metals and junior gold producers showed declines ranging up to 10 cents.
International Nickel and Noranda lost 3/8 in the base metals while Consolidated Smelters recovered a 1/2 loss to close unchanged from yesterday. White Anilite marked up the minimum fraction.
Dome and Hollinger lost fractions in senior golds and Teck-Hughes added four cents.

At Montreal
MONTREAL, March 4—(CP)—Securities dipped further minor amounts, despite resistant spots noted among leaders, in extremely dull dealings on the Montreal Stock Exchange and Curb Market today.
Industrial trading was at a standstill. Turnover was approximately 22,700 shares, a drop of 40,000 from Thursday and only 2,500 shares higher than Feb. 22 when a new 1949 low in transactions was set.
Minor losses also predominated in mines. Turnover in this group, however, was more active at 159,400 shares compared with 89,900 the previous session.
Closing averages indicated papers ahead .92 and golds ahead .45, but industrials dipped .4, utilities .1 and banks .03.
Of 164 issues traded, 45 were improved, 54 were easier and 65 remained unchanged. Four new highs and 12 new lows were established.

Not Surprised By Current Red Tactics

Students of Communist tactics are neither greatly surprised nor greatly impressed by the current round of statements pledging support to Russia as against their own countries in event of war.
The party has long been considered a fifth column wherever it operates outside Russia, and its loyalty to Moscow is generally accepted as a fact. There is hardly any doubt that, should war come, its members would be rounded up in every country involved just as though they were enemy nationals.
In the meantime, observers think the disloyalty proclamations serve principally to solidify the Western countries.
Efforts to read the Soviet mind have produced much speculation as to why the Communists choose to challenge nationalism and patriotism at this time.
United States State Department

experts say it is because they are hard pressed on the diplomatic front, rebuffed by socialists and other liberals with whom they have sought united fronts to gain power, and must return to direct revolutionary tactics.
Others call it merely another mischief-making campaign. A threat of dire splits to come if the Atlantic alliance is pushed through. A smoke screen for a new military alliance and new consolidation of power behind the iron curtain.
A military alliance in Eastern Europe would, of course, be merely a gesture. Compliance with Russian desires by the satellite governments would be automatic, anyway.
Incidentally, there are fifth columns in these countries, too. Under Communist regimes they would never dare to announce their intentions as have the Western Communists. But their slogan is "hold your fire until war. With war comes liberation."
An interesting sidelight is the announcement by the Japanese Communists that Japan comes first with them, that they would fight any invader. That will be taken by some observers as more evidence that the Oriental Communists are more of a Tito than a Moscow breed. But it could also be mere Oriental dissembling in

front of Gen. MacArthur.
There is the possibility of some aid that the Atlantic pact merely provided the timing for the new campaign. Despite ways strange to westerners, the Russian leaders are not dumb. To key up their people they hold up the bugaboo of capitalist-inspired war. But, unless they have fallen for their own propaganda, they know better.
Lenin saw the Russian revolution as merely the first step in world revolution. Stalin side-tracked active world revolution in favor of making Russia stronger before the issue was drawn too fine. He "abolished" the Comintern during the war as a sop to American lend-lease.
Now Russia is stronger, living conditions are better if still not up to pre-war. It could be that Stalin is returning to the Lenin line; that a new Comintern will call on the proletariat to march, ignoring national boundaries in what the Communists might think would be the final campaign to take over the world.
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
