ceived that Dr. Fenwick left his home on a call and returned about ten minutes later to find his house in flames. The block was roped off, and the firemen would not allow him to pass. He was told, however, that his wife had been rescued.

When the ruins were cleared, the bodies of Mrs. Fenwick, Miss Barnes her cousin who was visiting her, and her maid, were found in the debris. Dr. Fenwick identified his wife by the watch she wore.

SOLDIER, DRUNK KILLS SERGEANT AT LONDON, ONT

Cold Blooded Murder By A Private Soldier— Shoots His Color Sergeant Through The Heart— Was Drunk, And Angry Because The Sergeant Reprimanded Him

LONDON, Ont., April 19—(Special)—Color Sergeant Lloyd, R. C. R., of Wolsley Barracks, was shot and instantly killed on Saturday by private Moir a young Scotchman. Moir had been down town celebrating on Good Friday and came home intoxicated.

Color Sergeant Lloyd was on duty when Moir came in, and noticed that he was improperly dressed. He remonstrated with him when Moir started to argue and left a moment later for the hospital. An orderly heard a shot and notified Color Sergeant Lloyd. Moir was found there with a Ross rifle and as soon as he saw Lloyd he cried "hands up" and deliberately shot him through the heart.

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ARRANGEMENTS FOR VISIT OF THE PRINCE OF WALES

Will Be Accompanied By A Brilliant Staff— United States And French Squadrons Will Be Present At The Celebration

LONDON, April 19—(Special)—Arrangements are completed for the second visit of the Prince of Wales to Canada in connection with the Quebec Ter-centenary. He will leave Portsmouth on a fast cruiser, July 16, arriving on the twenty-second. The fleet will precede him and welcome him on arrival.

The Prince will be accompanied by a brilliant staff. French and American squadrons will also be present. The Prince will remain until July 29, when he will return direct to England. It is impossible for him to visit the United States.

CRAZY SOLDIERS BREAK LOOSE IN MEXICAN CITY

Twenty-five Men Break Out Of Garrison— Kill Some Citizens

SAN FRANCISCO, April 19—(Special)—While almost the entire population of Mazatlan, Mexico, were participating in a religious feast Sunday twenty-five soldiers broke out of the garrison and began a wild career of rioting and bloodshed. Within half an hour they had killed two policemen and one other citizen, and had waylaid and robbed three men on outskirts of the City.

CASE OF JENKINS VERSUS R. MCNEILL

Particulars of Prohibition Inquiry at City Police Court

(Continued from The Guardian of Saturday) Following the evidence given in this case in Saturday's Guardian, A. W. Reddin was examined. He produced seventy certificates, signed by Dr. McNeill, authorizing different persons to get liquor at his drugstore between January 12 and April 8. All of these certificates represented deliveries. Some of them were for Andrew Hogan and some for Thomas, James, and John Donovan. He got other certificates from other doctors, and was always careful about dispensing to people who may have imposed on Dr. McNeill. John Byrne, of Byrne Bros., testified to filling orders from Dr. McNeill, for various persons—among them Andrew Hogan and Thomas Donovan. He produced 181 certificates from Dr. McNeill between the dates. He had refused to give liquor to some parties who came to him with certificates. Andrew Hogan told of being sick and going to Dr. McNeill on several occasions and getting certificates for liquor. He got one one day and on the following day got another. He was refused the liquor by the "Two Macs and by Byrne Bros. He had the grippe and rheumatism. He had several orders filled at A. W. Reddin. On March 7th he had rheumatism of the kidneys and got a certificate which was filled at Gillis. That night he was arrested. He had no liquor since, because he has been in jail. He was sick when he applied to Dr. McNeill. He was not getting anything for coming to court to testify. He was told to apply some of the liquor externally. His Honor: Did you use any of it externally? Witness—No. (Laughter) James Donovan and Henry Griffin gave evidence similar to the others who had got certificates and at 5.30 p. m., the case was postponed till Wednesday at 10 a. m.

HON. R. HARCOURT HAS RESIGNED IN ONTARIO

FIRE DESTROYEDS THREE BUILDING IN ST. JOHN

In The Western Portion Of The City, And Renders Six Families Homeless— Fire Is Supposed To Be Incendiary

ST. JOHN, N. B., April 19—(Special)—Fire early on Sunday morning destroyed three houses on the West side of the city and rendered six families homeless, injuring most of their household effects. The houses were owned respectively by Capt. David Fitzpatrick, John Gorrill and The Earl Co., Ltd.

The total loss will be about \$8,000, partially covered by insurance. The fire started in a barn in the rear of Gorrill's house, and spread to the others. It is believed to be of incendiary origin.

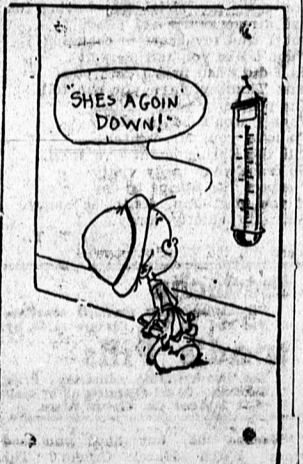

INTERNATIONAL S. S. ASSOCIATION

Twelfth Tri-ennial Convention Will Be Held In Louisville

The 12th tri-ennial Convention of the International Sunday School Association will be held in Louisville, Ky., June 18th-23rd. There will be about 2,500 delegates representing the States, Provincial and territorial associations. The suggested theme of the Convention will be the words of the Greeks to Philip, "We would see Jesus." The spiritual note will be dominant and it is expected that in many respects this will be one of the greatest religious conventions ever held on this Continent. Special provision is made for sessions for "Pastors," "the laymen," "Adult Department," "Temperance," "Teacher Training," and "Missions in the Sunday School." The speakers will represent the best from the different denominations—men thoroughly qualified to speak on the various themes which will come before the Convention. Probably one of the chief attractions will be Booker T. Washington, the great colored President and Orator. N. B. and P. E. I. can send thirty-six delegates and it is hoped the full quota may attend. It will be a rare opportunity to attend a Convention at so small a cost. It is expected that one-way first class fare will be granted. The rate from St. John will be thirty-two dollars. A later announcement will appear regarding this matter. The Louisville people entertain all delegates reporting on the official registration forms on the "Harvard plan," viz.—lodging and breakfast. Dinner and tea can be secured at the City restaurant and hotels at reasonable rates. All persons in N. B. and P. E. Island who plan on going are asked to report to T. S. Simms, St. John, and those from N. S. will send their names to C. E. Creighton, Halifax.

PARTICULARS OF THE DEATH

Of Garfield McDonald, Who Was Killed On The C. P. R.

The following particulars have been received regarding the death of Garfield McDonald, whose remains accompanied by his brother and sister are expected to arrive today. Very unexpectedly was young Garfield McDonald, a popular and well known fireman employed by the C. P. R., hurried into eternity on Thursday afternoon a few miles east of Agassiz. He was firing on an engine attached to an empty work train that was en route from Agassiz to Hope. Just as the train was crossing one of the bridges which span the ravines, MacDonald thrust his head out of the window of the engine when he was struck by one of the projecting ties. The force of the blow hurled MacDonald out of the cab and he fell into the rushing stream. When brought to the surface it was found that life was extinct. The deceased was 27 years old and was born in Prince Edward Island. An inquest was held at Agassiz on Thursday evening at which the jury returned the verdict that the deceased had met with an accidental death and attached no blame to anyone. The remains were brought to the City and have been removed to Center & Hanna's chapel room where will be sent to Charlottetown P. E. I., where the interment will take place in the family plot. The late Mr. MacDonald was a member of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers.
