WHISKEY AND BLOODSHED.

The record of the past few months of the lawless liquor traffic ought to move those in authority to earnest and strenuous effort to stamp that traffic out of existence. Within the current year in the vicinity of Belle Creek a man was killed in a drunken quarrel. A few nights ago the season of peace and good will was saddened by acts of violence and blood in Charlottetown and at Annandale. In the latter case a man was killed and a widow and children left to mourn. In our own city the victim of the shooting affray is languishing in the hospital. It is but a few months since the terrible crime by which Mr. Robert Jenkins' barns, livestock and crop were reduced to ashes. Whiskey selling by lawless men and women was the undoubted cause of all these horrible crimes and casualties.

The drunkenness rampant on our streets during the holiday season, the records of the police court, and conviction after conviction entered against the lawless rum-sellers, all go to prove the extent and the danger to the community from the traffic still being carried on in strong drink. That accursed traffic is adding incalculably to the sum of human misery and wretchedness in our midst; it is bringing reproach upon the fair fame of our Island home; it is blotting the pages of our Island history with deeds of cruelty and blood. And yet if the law were so enforced as to make it unprofitable to sell, the traffic would cease. Lax enforcement, spasmodic enforcement, will not effect the end we seek.

What is needed is for the Provincial Government to set its face against the lawless traffic with a resolute decision to stamp it out. Three months of energetic and determined effort would do this. But the attitude of the authorities must be so decided that the lawless rum-seller shall no longer rely upon a political pull, or upon an official friend that will get witness out of the way, or that will delay the execution of his fine, or that will perhaps open the prison doors when they have closed upon him. None other than lawless men are now engaged in the liquor traffic in this Island. They should be treated as public enemies and chastised with all the rigor of the law till they are compelled to close their dens and resort to honest industry.

We have now a new Government and a new leader. If they will do their duty honestly and fearlessly in carrying out the liquor laws, selecting good men for prosecutors, urging them to diligent action and upholding their hands, the Government will have good words from THE GUARDIAN. But half-hearted measures, put forth while holding sympathetic communication with the enemy, are little better than open encouragement to those who violate the law. They tend to perpetuate the curse in our midst. They tend to bring about a repetition of those deeds of violence and blood which have so shocked the public mind within the past few days. The question of most vital moment at the present time is shall we have an honest, vigorous effort to enforce the Prohibitory laws? It is a question bigger than party politics, a question that must be squarely faced by the new Government.

The king and the Princess Victoria attended services in the morning at the chapel Royal in St. James Palace and later dined quietly with the Duke and Duchess of Connaught at Clarence House. The queen sent an enormous quantity of toys with autograph cards to the children's hospital in London.




