siatically agreed to abolish the bar, (Hear, hear), and if they stood true to that and joined them in the battle, he saw the abolition of the bar nearer by a long way than was imagined. It was time they had help increasing help; and they had help also from the Roman Catholic church—the Presbyterians, and they hoped they would have the Congregationalists helping them, too, and help were not on the battlefield alone any longer.

Reverting to the question of the union, he hoped that by the time of their general conference in a year from now they would be in a position to say definitely one way or the other, what they were to do. He thought they ought to have such an answer by that time as would enable the Methodist Church to say: "God your way to join in union with us now, perhaps in 50 years you may, but we are going on with the zeal of the Fathers and the determination of the early Methodist heroes. We are bound to do it; we cannot linger, until men make up their minds. We have our Methodist responsibilities and faith and polity and doctrine." They could not afford to weaken down. He expressed himself against a waiting policy; he believed in going forward with the true evangelistic spirit.

The General Superintendent also touched upon a charge that he said was made sometimes, that their work was engaged in card playing when they ought to be at the prayer meeting, and it was said that their women sometimes went in for gambling for Godly women to take heed to their ways and for Godly men to help them in every way that would keep back that influence, because if it wormed its way among them, it would mean the honey-combing of the pillars of Zion. He prayed the living God to give the men of the circuits courage, life, faith and fidelity to the glorious gospel. May God help, for certainly without His indulgence they could never wield the power which made them a church, and upon which they and he rested that day, and without which they could never have been there—the power of Godly life and self-denial of worldly lusts. (Applause).

LAYMEN'S ASSOCIATION

The Laymen's Missionary Association met in the Ladies' Parlor of the Hartz Memorial Hall at 2 p.m. Dr. J. M. Palmer of Sackville presided and about thirty delegates were present.

After formally opening the meeting the President gave an address to the Association, giving particulars of the work of the Association during the past year. A letter was read from Rev. J. H. Arnap, Toronto, Secretary of the Laymen's Missionary Movement of Canada, enclosing the following resolution:—"On motion of Mr. T. H. Preston and Rev. F. C. Stephenson, M.D., it was resolved that, in the opinion of this Executive, the time has arrived when a definite and permanent plan of appointment to membership in the Dominion Committee of the Methodist Church should be adopted in order that the Methodist Church may secure the best possible results from the work of the Movement. To this end it would recommend that the Dominion Committee, be heretofore composed of the officers of the Missionary Society, of members elected by the Laymen's Associations of the various annual conferences, one from each; and such other laymen, not exceeding twenty, as the General Board may nominate."

ELECTION OF OFFICERS

The Association then proceeded with the election of officers. The following were all re-elected:— President—Dr. J. M. Palmer, Sackville. Vice-President—J. M. Lamont, Fredericton. Secretary-Treasurer—R. D. Smith, St. John. In the absence of Mr. R. D. Smith, Mr. C. A. Sampson, Fredericton, is acting Secretary-Treasurer for this Conference. A nominating committee, with one member from each district, whose business it will be to nominate representatives to the Laymen's Association, was then appointed. The following were elected:— St. John District—Mr. C. F. McTavish. Fredericton District—Mr. J. J. Weddall. Woodstock District—Mr. J. A. Lindsay. Chatham District—Mr. A. Beers. Sackville District—Prof. Hunton. St. Stephen District—Mr. T. O. Sullivan. Charlottetown District—Prof. G. D. Steele. Summerside District—Mr. M. R. Laird.

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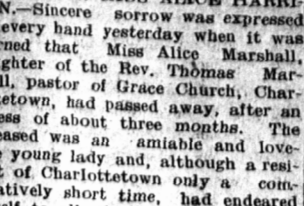

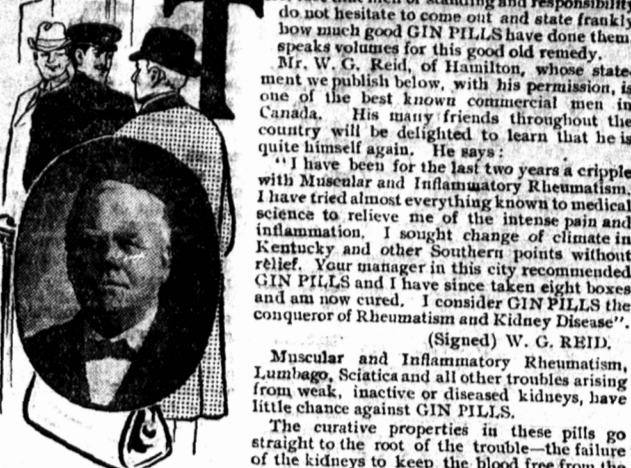
