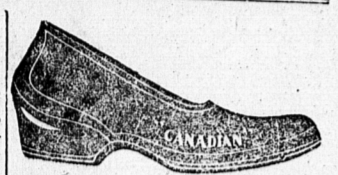

L. Saunders; Minister of Inland Revenue—Hon. A. J. MacAdam; Postmaster General—Hon. L. D. Durand; Secretary of State—Hon. F. T. Walker; Minister of Agriculture—J. N. Conroy. Member for Cornwall was the choice of the Government for the Speakership.

SAYS AUSTRALIA CANNOT AFFORD ADEQUATE NAVY

MELBOURNE, March 13.—Rear Admiral Henderson who at the request of the Commonwealth Government has been sent by the Admiralty to inquire into the naval defence of the country, has to make his report to the Cabinet. The Rear Admiral has made a number of remarkable statements. He maintains that Australia cannot afford to keep up a navy commensurate with the length of coastline, and consequently that the Commonwealth must co-operate with the British authorities on a population basis. At present an outlay of £14,000,000 is involved in the work of policing the South Pacific. He recommends for the South Australia fleet fifty-two warships, including eight armored and ten protected cruisers; eighteen destroyers and twelve submarines, the whole to be manned by 15,000 officers and men. The cost of construction of this program exceeds over 22 years and will amount to the sum of £52,000,000. To this must be added the charge of a quarter million per annum for depreciation so that the final figure to be taken into consideration by the Government is £73,000,000. This refers to the defense of the adequate defence of harbors which are numerous and open to attack. In carrying out the program as proposed twenty-three ships would be ready in 1918 and forty-eight in 1922.

The principal naval basis under Rear Admiral Henderson's scheme are to be Sydney, Brisbane, Westport, Port Stephens, Fremantle and Port Lincoln. The fleet to be divided into Eastern and Western divisions under the command of rear admirals. The personnel to be drawn as far as possible from Australia and training of officers to be carried out at the Naval College at Sydney. Thirteen high power radiographic stations to be established around the coasts. For obtaining the best results from defensive power of the fleet it is suggested that land forces be coordinated as far as possible. This ambitious program comes as a surprise to politicians at the head of affairs. At the Imperial Conference in London this year, Premier Ward, of New Zealand, will raise the question of an Imperial Council defence.

B. Fitz-Warren Smith, of England, who has been managing a farm in Eldon for some time past, left yesterday afternoon for Georgetown. Mr. Smith is en route to W. N. Ex. Man., and from there he will proceed to Duck Lake, Man., where a party with whom he is concerned has a 10,000 acre allotment of land. Mr. Smith has been the guest of Prof. C. M. and Mrs. Wright, city, for the past few days.

A most successful operation was performed at the Victoria General Hospital recently, when Harry McDonald, of Prince Edward Island, had a new joint inserted in his foot. McDonald, who was a member of the crew of the schooner Mersy, had his foot laid frost-bitten. The bone of the foot was affected and an operation was necessary. Dr. Hoan of the Hospital staff performed the operation and inserted a false joint in the ball of McDonald's foot. The operation proved very successful and McDonald left for his home last week delighted with the result of the operation.—Halifax Chronicle.
