By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, March 23—Final figures of the National Hockey League campaign shows Tiny Thompson, goalie on the Canadian Press all-star team, succeeded Alex Campbell as shut-out king of the league. Thompson shut out the opposition in 10 games against nine for young Mike Karakas of Chicago Black Hawks. The Boston goalie had 83 goals scored against him in 48 games, nine less than were fired past the Chicago rookie.

Dave Kerr, Rangers, and George Hainsworth, Toronto, were next with eight shut-outs each. Wilf Cude, Canadiens and Norm Smith, Detroit, had six; Roy Worters, Americans, three; Lorne Chabot, Maroons, two and Bill Beveridge, with Maroons for the first part of the season, one.

Thompson is expected to be announced winner of the Vezina trophy for least goals against. Chabot took it last year when with Chicago.

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Maroons And Red Wings Set For Clash

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, March 23—Tickets went like hot cakes at the Forum today for the opening tomorrow night of the National Hockey League championship, Detroit Red Wings, boasting the highest scoring line in the League this season, arrived tonight to clash with the Stanley Cup holders, Montreal Maroons.

Top teams in their two sections, they open the three-of-five first-place series here tomorrow and continue it on Thursday with the scene shifting to Detroit for the third game on Sunday. If other games are necessary they will be at Detroit Tuesday and Thursday of next week.

A team of veterans, with few changes from the Stanley Cup winning squad of last year, Maroons were established slight favorites here to take a lead with them to Detroit.

Bruins Confident
BOSTON, March 23—Although two players will be hobbled a little by injuries, there was glowing confidence in the Boston Bruins camp tonight on the eve of the Stanley Cup playoff battle against Toronto Maple Leafs.

Goalie Tiny Thompson, padded ace of the National Hockey League will carry an injured hip into tomorrow night's opening game of the home-and-home total goal series between the second place teams. Winger Peggy O'Neil has a painful ankle. Both were injured when the Bruins played to a bruising draw with the Leafs in Toronto last Thursday.

Otherwise, the beanowners will be at full strength.

The advance guard of Toronto hockey writers reported the Leafs will be free of casualties for the fray.

Amerk Sniper Tops Scorers In The N.H.L.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, March 23—In his second year of big league competition Dave "Sweeney" Schirmer was hailed today as scoring leader of the National Hockey League.

Unofficial figures showed the quick but effective left winger of New York Americans compiled 45 scoring points to succeed big Charlie Conacher of Toronto Maple Leafs on top of the heap. Schirmer scored 19 goals, 26 assists to lead the whole league by five points while Conacher slipped from his 36-21-57 of last year to wind up in a five-way tie for third place.

Scoring was lower all along the line this year with but three players amassing 40 or more points compared with nine that reached that figure last season. Twenty-two goal men were scarce, three topping that figure against 10 last year.

A fine closing drive by Marty Barry, centre for Detroit Red Wings, landed him in a tie with Paul Thompson of Chicago Black Hawks at the head of the United States section and second in the whole league. Each had 40 points, Barry with 21-19-40 and Thompson, 17-23-40. A year ago Syd Howe of Detroit was sectional leader with 22 goals, 23 assists, 47 points.

While Conacher's 23 goals were far below the 36 he hung up last year the big bomber still remained at the top of actual goal scorers with the same number as Bill Thomas, centre of Leafs second line. The two, with Barry, were the only men to pass the 20-mark.

Oxford Crew Show Up Well In Practice Run

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, March 23—(C. P. Cable)—Oxford University's \$1,000 launch, presented by Lord Nuffield for use in coaching the Dark Blues for the intervarsity boat race April 4, was tampered with over the weekend. It was discovered today.

Police are investigating the damage, which occurred at the moorings on the Thames. The float chambers in two carburetors were removed and the boat could not be used during the Oxford crew's morning outing.

This afternoon Oxford's eight rowed from Chiswick steps to Hammermill Bridge in three minutes 42 seconds, three seconds faster than any previously recorded time over that distance.

Magedomas Score Easy 7-1 Victory Over Maroons

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, March 23—Brookville Magedomas defeated Moncton Maroons 7-1 here tonight in the second game of the Allan Cup playoff series. The Ottawa valley title holders won the round in two straight games and will meet either Montreal Royals or Hamilton Tigers in the next series.

Magedomas outplayed the Maritime champions in every department and were never headed in either game. They had too much weight, speed and experience for the Maroons who are one of the youngest and lightest outfits ever to start on the Allan Cup trail.

The loss for the Maroons ended a three year domination by Maritimes over Canadian amateur hockey and meant the Allan Cup will travel to Quebec, Ontario or the West this winter.

Leading the Brookville attack was Jo-Jo Graboski their one-eyed star who might play for a National Hockey League squad if he had two good eyes. He posted two goals and passed to Gordie Lowery for a third. Other Brookville goals were scored by Price, Lowery (2), Kennedy and Dexter.

George Appleby posted the lone Moncton goal when he sneaked the puck away from Mike McMahon in the second period and rifled a shot into a high corner of the net behind Tice.

The Maroons often had the edge in territorial play but could not fathom the heavy hitting Brookville defence. They lacked experience when they worked in close and their shooting was weak at times.

A small crowd, under 2,000 people, saw the game and Maroons won many friends by their battling spirit.

Murray Nosed Out By Grant In Hard Match

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) HAMILTON, Bermuda, March 23—(C. P. Cable)—Bobby Murray, Canadian tennis ace, went down to defeat today in a brilliant five-set match with Bryan Bisy Grant of Atlanta, Georgia, in finals for the Bermuda amateur tennis championships.

The Georgia Giant-Killer, ranked no. 3 in the United States, nosed out the Montreale 6-4, 3-6, 7-6, 6-2, 7-5 in a long, grueling match that had all the aspects of an endurance test. Murray was almost as adept as Grant in keeping the ball in play during long rallies.

Before losing the international match, the Canadian pulled out of a hole and forced the final set into extra games. He was down two games to four at the end of the sixth game but drew up to five-all before losing the last two.

In reaching the finals, Murray defeated Frank Parker, former junior champion of the United States and now ranked no. 7 player there, in the quarter final round, and Walter Hines and Laird Watt, also of Montreal, were defeated yesterday in the finals for the men's doubles championship by Grant and Gilbert Hall in straight sets. The two were eliminated from mixed doubles competition in early rounds.

Karl Schroeder, sensational Swedish player, and Madame Henriette, of France, Bermuda women's singles champion, won the mixed doubles title today defeating Wilmer Hines and Mrs. Dorothy Anderson 3-6, 6-4, 6-3.

Governor Sir Thomas Astley Cubitt of Bermuda presented prizes at the conclusion of the tournament.

Giesebrecht Scores Late In Third Period To Give Lumber Kings 4-3 Win

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONCTON, N. B., March 23—A goal from the stick of brilliant Roy Giesebrecht gave Pembroke Little Lumber Kings a 4-3 victory over Amherst Canucks here tonight and advanced the Ottawa Valley Junior champions to the semi-finals of the Memorial Cup play-downs.

The blond Pembroke centre broke a 3-3 tie just before the end of the third game of a sizzling series that recalled the days of the Big Four league to Moncton fans.

Had Only Lead
Valiant Canucks had recovered from a 9-4 licking in the first game to take the second 3-2. Tonight the Maritime Champions shut out the visitors in the opening period and held a one-goal lead at the end of the second, only to fall before a terrific last-period bombardment.

The Ripley brothers—Carl and Frank—opened Canucks' first period attack, each scoring unassisted while White defended the Amherst citadel like a veteran.

Already the hero of the series, Giesebrecht gave the Lumber Kings their first counter early in the second and snapped in another after Lowther had added one to the Amherst total.

Spectacular Rush

Entering the third period one down, the visitors let loose everything they had until Garrow deadlocked the score on a pass from McBain. It looked like an overtime battle but Giesebrecht took the uncertainty out of it with a spectacular rush through the Amherst defence and a smart shot that didn't give White a chance.

The young Maritime champions went ahead in the Little Lumber Kings when the opening whistle blew and set back on their heels by a relentless attack. The Ottawa Valley kids were determined to continue in the Memorial Cup play and fired everything they had into the assault.

How they were held from scoring in that wild first period is answered only by the brilliant playing of Norbert White, Amherst goalie who turned aside over twenty shots. In the meantime Bob McQuirter in the opposite end of the rink had comparatively little to do, but the Canucks when they did break away from the Lumber Kings were pure dynamite.

Frank Ripley drew first blood on a solo effort and later in the period fired another and later in the period brother Carl put the Maritime champions two ahead.

The outlook wasn't brilliant for the Pembroke six as the second period got under way but Roy Giesebrecht put the Lumber Kings back into the running with a goal on a pass from Carmen Keon. Creighton Lowther retaliated for Amherst and then young Giesebrecht tallied for the Ottawa Valley youngsters again as the Kings trailed 3-2 going into the final session.

Amherst Canucks made the fatal mistake of laying back on the defence in that furious third period. It was only a question of time before the terrific pressure which the Lumber Kings applied must bring results. When Ramsay Garrow went in the tieing goal on a pass from Clifford McEatin, it was too late then for the Canucks to do much about it. The Lumber Kings met their attacks with a burly defensive barrier and paved the way for young Giesebrecht who is one of the finest Juniors to appear here for some time, to get in his brilliant individual work. With less than two minutes to go the blond youngster nicked up a loose puck and wheeled into scoring position, fired it into the twines for the goal which sent his team further along the trail in search of the Memorial Cup.

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) PENSACOLA, Fla., March 23—Those surprising young Chicago Cubs who rang up 21 straight home-stretch victories to beat the Cardinals in the National League pennant last season, are out to repeat—but they're taking nothing for granted.

"We're not resting on last year's laurels," said Manager Charlie Grimm today. "Our job is tougher than before because they'll all be shooting for us. But I think we have a swell 'chance to come through again."

Grimm and his Bruins have every reason to be optimistic. Last year's champs have another year's experience under their belts. Lon Warneke, star right-hander, is as good as ever and Chuck Klein is looking like the same fellow who led the National League in hitting in 1932. Warneke injured his salary whip in the fifth game of the last world's series with Detroit Tigers. But the big fellow is again burning them over with all his old time speed and cunning.

There has been a lot of talk that Klein might be sent to the Phillies in return for pitcher Curt Davis, but Grimm, who is entirely sold on the outfielder, spiked these reports by announcing Klein is not for sale or trade.

Except that manager Grimm will be back on first base, the Cubs will stake their 1936 chances on the 1935 lineup.

English Racing Season Opens

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) LINCOLN, England, March 23—(C. P. Cable)—The flat racing season opened here today with dull, mild weather prevailing. The track was in perfect condition.

Prospects are for a record field for the Lincolnshire Handicap, run over the mile route Wednesday. There are 40 probable starters, against the record of 36 in the years 1881 and 1932.

Expert observers predicted the race would be the customary toss-up.

Favorite in the betting, is Col. F. T. Halse's Law Court, quoted at odds of 10 to 1. Overcoat and R. B. Strassburger's Boethius; follow at 100 to 8 while Screamer, owned by Lord Glanely and the former favorite, was quoted at 100 to 1 along with Lord Portia's The Blue Boy, C. W. Gordon's Sea Bquest was quoted at 13 to 1.
