MR. HANEY ARRIVES

His Plant is Coming By Boat.

WILL WANT MECHANICS

At Good Wages—The Bridge to be Entirely Completed in 1901.

Mr. M. J. Haney, of Toronto, contractor for the construction of the Hillsboro bridge is at the Davies Hotel. He is here to complete preliminary arrangements. The machinery to be used in the construction will be brought to Charlottetown by boat from Montreal. A portion of the machinery used will be brought from the far west where it was used in the construction of the Crow's Nest Railway. It will be remembered that 300 miles of the above railroad was constructed in 14 months.

Mr. Haney has also secured the contract for the construction of the approaches to the bridge. The bridge will be completed within the next year.

Mr. Haney says that he will require a large number of mechanics to whom good wages will be paid.

In a day or two, tenders will be called for the supplying of 5,000,000 feet of lumber to be used in the construction. Some 3,000 piles will also be required. It is thought that a large portion of the lumber will be secured in the province. The stone will be imported from Nova Scotia.

Mr. Haney says that plans and specifications call for a first class piece of work.
