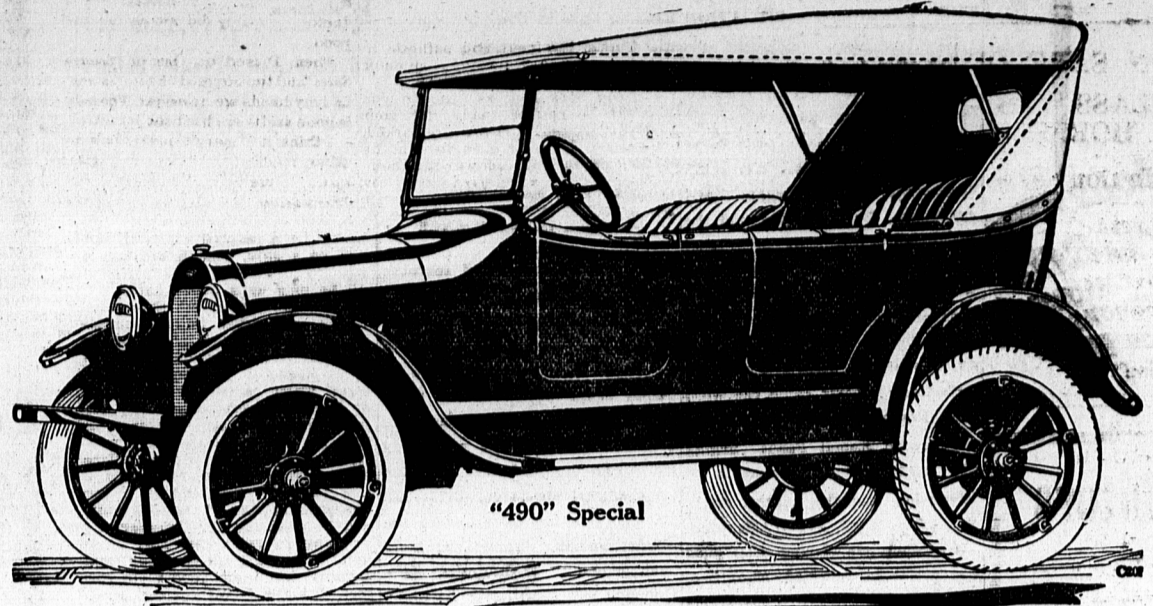

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IN MEMORIAM

THE LATE MR. BRENTON HOOPER

His many friends were shocked and grieved to learn of the death of Mr. Brenton Hooper, son of Mr. Henry C. Hooper, this city. The late Mr. Hooper had just passed the threshold of his early manhood, being only twenty-nine years of age. For the past six months his health had been failing, and although the best medical skill was secured he gradually grew weaker, and on Friday last his spirit took its flight to Him who gave it. He had been engaged in farming at Connolly's Corner, St. Peter's Road, but for some months past had been living at his father's residence, so that he could be more easily medically treated. The late Mr. Hooper was well known in Charlottetown, particularly amongst horsemen, for he took the deepest interest in racing the best breed of horses, and in driving the same, often having driven on the exhibition race track in the racing events of former years. He was a young man of genial personality, and his untimely death will be a sad blow to his wife and to his parents, sisters, brothers and other relatives. It is a curious co-incidence that Mr. Brenton Hooper's brother, Thomas W. who was killed in the war, and himself, were both born on the same date, namely the 4th of February, and on the same hour of that day, and they both died in the 29th year of their age. The funeral which was very largely attended took place yesterday, Sunday from his father's residence, 235 Fitzroy Street, interment being made at the Peoples Cemetery.

Great Britain Assists Australia Immigration

(Special to The Guardian.)

LONDON, Sept 24—Within the limits of the Empire Settlement Act the British government is ready to give financial assistance to immigration schemes on various lines.

The assisted passage agreement with Australia provides one third passage money. A free grant and the balance as a loan in suitable cases. Great Britain and the Commonwealth sharing the cost equally.

The Western Australia settlement scheme is now finally arranged. Britain contributes one third of the interest on a loan of £1,200,000 for development and settlement of 75,000 new persons within three years. The Commonwealth of West Australia sharing the remainder of the cost. The proposed Victorian scheme for 10,000 independent settlers the Commonwealth contributes toward interest on the capital and Britain is asked to contribute £300 towards a Victoria loan of £1,200,000 to each individual settler, repayable in thirty six years. A similar tri-party financial arrangement would be quite feasible between Britain, Canada and a province, or Britain, Canada and private association if a satisfactory scheme were drawn up.

Help probably would be most urgently needed in early years. Later on the success of settlers, it is expected, would justify the transfer of the whole cost to the locality benefited.
