MRS. GEORGE H. MORTON

MacLellan and Mary MacDonald both natives of Prince Edward Island. Her father, John MacLellan at one time built several churches in Prince Edward Island and Cape Breton. He was an uncle of the Reverend John B. McIntyre of Tracadie.

Mrs. Morton's mother was a sister of John Macdonald also of Tracadie. Her funeral was attended by many relatives and friends, former residents of Prince Edward Island.

Mrs. Morton is survived by her husband and four daughters and one son, George H. Morton, Mrs. Walter Sawtelle, Mrs. Ethel Scanlon Miss Elita Morton, Miss Mary Morton, respectively. Firth, pastor of the church who had been a constant visitor at the bedside of the deceased during his illness, conducted the service, assisted by Rev. Wm. McLeod. The pallbearers were: J. D. Livingston, J. A. Beaton, R. D. McKay, Geo. T. Turner, Allan McSwain, D. M. Macdonald and the hearse was driven by J. C. Turner. Interment was made in Dundas cemetery.

Ukrainians Plan To Publish Paper

MONTREAL, Nov. 1.—Organization, through the adoption of a constitution, of the Canadian Ukrainian Citizens Association in this city took place yesterday afternoon at a meeting held in the Taras Shevchenko Ukrainian Reading Society quarters. About 200 were present, and great enthusiasm was shown in the plans as laid down by Paul Korinsky, the president, and Joseph Desmet, secretary.

The objectives of the association are to promote in every legal way a political interest among Canadian Ukrainians and to assist in Canadian industrial and educational development. The chief aim is to teach the members to become good and loyal citizens of their adopted country. In order to make its influence felt, the association plans to publish a paper in Montreal that will be widely distributed throughout the country.

It was decided that the opening meeting of the association will be held some time next month and will take the form of a formal banquet. This is the first group of its kind that has been organized in Canada and it hopes to extend its activities to other parts of the Dominion later.

There are about 20,000 Ukrainians in this city and about 400,000 in Canada.

Supervised Diet To Cope With Obesity

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 1.—Dangers of obesity, with its strain on the heart and other organs, were outlined for the international assembly of the Interstate Post-Graduate Medical Association here by Dr. David P. Barr, Bush professor of medicine in Washington University, St. Louis, Mo.

He spoke as one of three specialists who discussed thyroid activities. The others were Dr. Max Ballin of Detroit, Mich., and Dr. Frank H. Lahey, of Boston, Mass. Obesity, Dr. Barr told the physicians and surgeons here for the meeting, is the result of inherited tendencies, unusual activity of the endocrine glands, or of the combination of overeating and under-exercise. He advised a careful and supervised diet.

There are two kinds of goiters, Dr. Barr said, those that cause heart disease and those that do not. He advocated surgery as the safest method of removal of the harmful goiters.

Dr. Lahey recommended the removal of an adequate portion of the thyroid gland to remedy hyperthyroidism, or over-secretion of the gland. He said that mortality in the operation is only seven-tenths of one per cent in 2,700 cases in his knowledge, and termed the risk of disease far greater than the risk of operation.

Dr. Ballin discussed the parathyroid, a small gland that lies behind the main thyroid, and said that when it becomes overactive, too much calcium is put into the blood stream and is drawn from the bones, weakening the skeletal structure.
