PRESENTATION - The golden anniversary of H. Winfield, General Manager of the company and President of the Acadia Chapter of the Telephone Pioneers of America, to present the guest of honor with a life certificate in that organization. Mr. Winfield also presented Mr. Winfield, on behalf of the company, with a 50 years service button made of gold in which have been set 10 sapphires, one for every five years. Following an address in which Mr. MacKay paid high tribute to Mr. Winfield as a man and a telephone executive and in which he outlined his career briefly, H. O. C. Baker presented him with a gift on behalf of the employees. The gift presented by Mr. Baker included a five-piece matched set of elegant silverware and an illuminated address signed by approximately 800 employees and bound in morocco leather. Mr. Winfield spoke with feeling of his appreciation of the thoughtfulness of the employees in presenting him with the gift and assured them of his continued interest in their interests.
