SCHOOL PROBLEMS IN ENGLAND

LONDON, April 20—The board of education in England has just been called upon to decide several cases in which attempts were made to exclude alien children from the benefits of local scholarships on the ground that they were not born in the country, although educated in it. Decisions on this effect were given by the educational authorities in the case of valuable scholarships open to competition at Barking and All Hallows. The legality of them was disputed by resident Jews, and the board of education decided in favor of the Protestants. For a third scholarship a Jewish boy was recommended, but the governors passed him over on the ground that he was not born in the United Kingdom. The board of education was again appealed to, and advised the governors to reconsider their decision which was declared to be unjustifiable.
