It is a crazy fantastic deadened sort of war here. The Germans cannot use the port, and a major offensive to capture it would afford little strategic advantage.

Dunkerque has been invested since early in September. It was last reported besieged by British troops of the 1st Canadian Army and at one time Czech units under Gen. Czerka's command held the perimeter around the port.

Local Contractor Dies At Home

Mr. Daniel V. Darrach, Charlottetown contractor, died yesterday at his home, 271 Queen Street, East, in his 56th year.

He had been unwell for several years, suffering from asthma. On December 4th he entered the Prince Edward Island Hospital for treatment but returned to his home ten days later.

A native of New Haven, he was a son of Mrs. Angus Darrach, now residing in East Royal, and the late Mr. Darrach who was well known in his time as a bridge builder.

He was a veteran of the First Great War and after he returned from overseas he operated a contracting business at Quincy, Mass. In 1929 he returned to this Province and took up his residence in Charlottetown. He was a man of sterling qualities and will be greatly missed by his family, his friends and associates.

Berman, it features a superb cast including Signe Hasso, Anne Cronin, Jessica Tandy, Felix Bressart and other outstanding performers.

Tracy has surpassed his triumphs in "A Guy Named Joe" and other of his recent hits, and Miss Hasso is not only lovely to look at but in an exciting portrayal as Toni, who shelters Heiser from the Nazis.

"The Seventh Cross" tells of the successful escape of one of seven fugitives from a concentration camp in the fall of 1936 when, although war had not yet begun, such camps were fast filling with German citizens who rejected the Nazi creed.

Two sisters, Mrs. MacBeath and Laura are expected to arrive home tonight to attend the funeral which will be held at his residence Wednesday afternoon at 1.30.
