This is no trick at all but a mean, low, cowardly act and the party or parties should be brought to justice.

The first congregation or church meeting of the Laymen's Missionary Union gathering, was held in the Baptist Church last Sunday evening. The meeting, which was one of much interest and profit, was conducted by laymen. The choir sang missionary hymns and a strong and most appropriate anthem. The service was well conducted by A. F. Webster. The first speaker was R. H. Jenkins, who gave in ten minutes a clear and instructive account of the "History and Progress of the Laymen's Movement." J. P. Gordon followed and crowded his ten minutes full of facts and figures, and by the aid of the "missionary chart" showed clearly that this generation of Christians could and should give the Gospel to this generation of heathens. The speaker cleared away many of the old-time objections and showed the task possible. Canada's part in this great work was the next subject. The speaker, J. K. Ross, who said forty million heathens and about two million non-Christians at home, was Canada's task in this world movement. Though it was a great task, it was still possible, and in view of the fact that Canada was the first country to organize for the campaign, he felt sure she could do all her duty—and the many good reasons assigned made the audience feel the same assurance. The last speaker A. W. Sterns, had for his subject the "home trust"—the Duty of our Church in this great movement. This touched the vital point, the practical thing, the individual. The speaker, in his own clear and concise manner, pointed out the part we, as a church, should take, and the way we should do it, by means of the weekly offering, using the duplex envelopes, which have been supplied by the church for this purpose. It was shown that while a small part of our people gave last year for missions almost half the required five dollars per member, that with a small increase and a general canvass of all our men, the amount could easily be made up the coming year. After a few well chosen words by way of review by the leader, this profitable, initial, church meeting, in the interests of this world-wide "movement" closed with the singing of Francis R. Havergal's hymn—"Take My Life and Let it be Consecrated, Lord, to Thee."
