ed himself in favor of wide tires on vehicles of all kinds thus protecting the roads.

Mr. Gordon said that a change has often been asked for, that money has been spent without competition on a few favorites. People are anxious for good roads but farmers were not in favor of road machines. He wondered how the 630 miles unit for the road machine were to be cared for. In the time of Palmer & Haviland contractors were asked for but tenders exceeded the total revenue of the colony. He believed good roads could be made without road machines. Roads made in Cassars time with manual labor are good yet.

Premier Farquharson congratulated the Commissioner of Public Works upon the statistics he had collected which gave much valuable information. The Government is called upon to amend the Road Act Country people will appreciate a good law. If not satisfactory it can be amended. Many will have to pay more and some will be opposed to it, but many thousands of dollars will be saved to the treasury. Returns in the Public Works office show that many do not perform statue labor or pay commutation money, as overseers were not always exacting. The Government were not going to do that. In the case of Government taxes, no one would get clear. Many had been sued and more will be sued. Under the new system overseer will report to collectors of land tax, concerning men and horses and poll and horse taxes will be collected with very little extra expense. Although the road system since the introduction of machines was somewhat complicated, nevertheless the people of the country have had better roads. With the improvement which this act is expected to bring the people will have still better roads and money saved.

The resolution was then agreed to without amendment and a bill was introduced. Upon motion of Mr. Cumiskey the House resolved itself into a committee of whole with Mr. McWilliams in the chair, after which it adjourned until 10 this morning.

NEW CONTRACT RULING.

More Refrigerated Beef to be Used in British Army Than Formerly.

LONDON, April 12.—The director of contracts said to the representative of the Associated Press:

"The new rule applies only to refrigerated beef hit to be bought in the open market in London. It will not seriously affect the American trade as the total weekly supply for the army is only 200,000 pounds, which is barely two per cent. of the weekly imports of refrigerated beef into England from the United States. WHEN the Northumberland begins plying regularly between this port and Point du Chene the Summerside Board of Trade can rest on their oars.

MRS. David Rogers returned home Saturday evening from Truro where she was visiting her father Rev. Mr. Brien, who has been seriously ill. His friends on the Island will be pleased to learn that Mr. Brien is recovering.

A CASE of scarlet fever has developed in Summerside in the home of Mr. P. W. Morrison, his son Ralph being ill with the disease. The Board of Health has had the house quarantined and every precaution has been taken, so that it is believed all danger of its spreading has been removed.

WHEN the Northumberland begins carrying the mails on the Summerside-Point du Chene route the people of Summerside will get their Upper Canadian and U. S. mail from 38 to 40 hours earlier and the people of Charlottetown will get their Upper Canadian and U. S. mail about 20 hours earlier than under the present "up-to-date" arrangement.

A WORSE scare than poisoning has struck some owners of dogs in Summerside. The police officers have started in to enforce the by-laws relating to vicious dogs and the first victim last evening met its fate by a bullet from a 38 calibre revolver. The officers had an interesting case; after a search they found the dog carefully concealed in a bed at the home of its owner in the west end. Later in the evening another dog was disposed of in a similar way at the east end of the town and it is probable others will follow.

THE annual meeting of the Summerside Public Library was held in the Library room on Saturday evening with Mr. Neil McQuarry in the chair. After the reading of the minutes the accounts for the year were submitted showing a nest balance in the hands of the Secretary of \$100.24 which amount it was decided to be invested in new books. It was resolved that the thanks of the Board be tendered the Crystal Hockey team for the entertainment given by them, also to Mr. Louis B. Hunt for proceeds of a special band night at the rink and to Mr. Harold Morris and members of the Summerside Cornet band for giving their services free on both these occasions. Principal R. H. Campbell was requested also to convey the thanks of the Board to the pupils for a concert given by them. Votes of thanks were also tendered the Librarian and teachers of the schools who have attended every Saturday to the exchanging and delivering of books.

An adjourned meeting of the Town Council was held last night with Mayor McNeil and all the Councillors present. A large batch of bills were passed which included amounts for changes and repairs to the Market Building. Mr. Neil McLeod was present and presented a claim for Mr. John L. McKinnon for the sum of \$15, being a balance of an amount paid for seats while teaching in the old grammar school in the year 1875. The matter was laid over. A communication was read from Mr. T. C. P. Ye asking for a side walk on the North side of Convent street, west of Central. The matter was referred to the street committee. A number of applications were read for position of teamsters, caretaker of horses and for general work on the streets and that of Mr. James Gamble to do the work at \$1 per day was accepted. Tenders for printing were read from Messrs Williams and Crue, the Pioneer Publishing Company and Mr. W. A. Brennan. The matter was referred to the purchasing committee. The usual by-law for levying a poll tax of \$1 on all male inhabitants over 21 years of age was passed.

School Board Meeting.

A special meeting of the School Board was held last night. The resignation of Mr. Lammal Miller was accepted and after the different members of the board expressed themselves in an appreciation manner of the work of Mr. Miller the applications of Fenton Aitken, New Glasgow; Chas. W. Kelly, Alberton; E. Bowness and J. M. Duncan were read.

After some discussion Mr. W. V. Newson was appointed Principal. A letter was read from the City Council asking that the Board join them in a petition to the Legislature to allow them to open a street at the upper end of Prince Street grounds.

The Board agreed to this on consideration that the city maintain the school fence. A bill for nine fryeides was ordered to be paid.

Mr. Duncan's application was accompanied by a numerous signed petition. A petition from the teachers was also presented asking that he be appointed.

The Board expressed themselves as strongly disapproving of the action of the teachers, contending that it placed teacher in a false position with respect to any appointee whether it would be the person for whom they signed the petition or the person for whom they did not sign it.

Returned to McGill autumn 1900 to take a post graduate course—Taking Natural Science, Higher English and English Composition, practical and Theoretical Pedagogy was awarded a fellowship with \$350.00 per year by the University of Chicago March 1901.—His final examinations for M. Sc. degree take place April 30th inst. It will thus be seen that the Board of School Trustees are fortunate in securing the services of a well qualified teacher, probably the first man taking charge of a school in the Province who has had a course of training in McGill Normal School in the Art of teaching.
