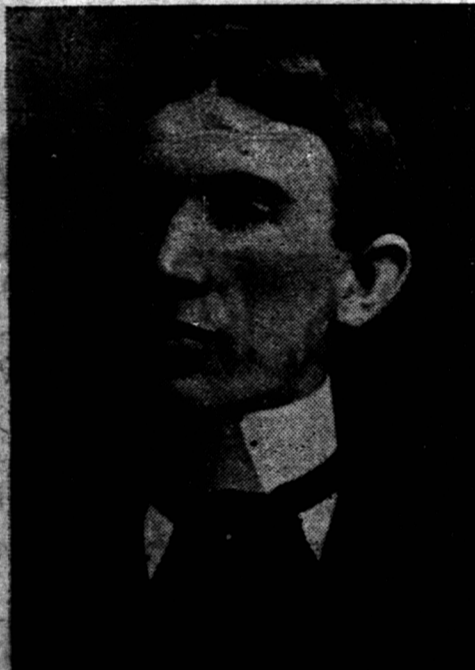

AN IMPORTANT BILL UP FOR DISCUSSION.

All Telephone, Telegraph and Electric Light Poles

WILL BE UNDER CONTROL OF THE CITY

If the New Measure Becomes Law—Considerable Opposition Made to the Measure by Representatives of Different Companies.

House met at 11.30 a. m. Mr. Whear asked leave to present a petition from John D. Reid and Samuel E. Reid, President and Secretary of the Tryon Woolen Manufacturing Company, praying that the Act Incorporating the said Company be amended.

Received and read. A Bill in accordance was received and read a first time and referred to the Private Bills Committee.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Rogers the House resolved itself into a committee of the whole with Dr. Douglas in the chair to consider a Bill to amend an Act respecting the Garnishment of Debts.

It shall be lawful, in each of the circuits in each of the several County Courts in this Province, for the Clerk of the County Court in such circuit to issue an attaching order or summons under the provisions of sections four five and twelve respectively of the said Act; such summons or order to be made returnable on the first day of the next ensuing session of the said Court to be held in the circuit out of which the said summons or order was issued.

Such summons or order when issued on the application of a judgement creditor, shall be upon the affidavit of such creditor, his attorney or agent which affidavit shall be in accordance with the requirements of the affidavit mentioned in Section four of the said Act; and when issued on the application of a creditor who may not have obtained judgement, shall be upon the affidavit of such creditor, his attorney or agent, which affidavit shall be in accordance with the requirements of the affidavit mentioned in Section 12 of the said Act.

Every clerk of the County Court shall within the circuit have the same power as a Judge of the County Court now has and such attaching order or summons shall have the same force and effect as if the same were issued by a Judge of one of the County Courts in this Province.

Mr. Whear moved the second reading of the Bill to amend the City of Charlottetown Incorporation Act in regard to electric light, telegraph and telephone poles. He pointed out that the poles should be placed by the City Surveyor.

A reading to the Act the ones now erected

cannot be altered. Poles once placed the City has no authority to remove the same or any control over the same. He showed that at the present time a pole is in a dangerous position on the Brighton Road. The Company have been notified, but they will not act in regard to its removal. Another pole stands on the Apothecaries Hall corner, perfectly useless with not a wire on it. The company has been notified but they refuse to remove the pole. The city should not only have control of not only the future erection but of all poles in the city. The Council is composed of eight intelligent men elected by the vote of the city and they can be depended upon to do what is right.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson said as he understood the Bill the city wish to control the poles of the different companies. There is a great deal to be said about these wires and posts. He did not think the City Council would stay long if they did anything that was unfair. He thought that any grievance in connection with the companies should be brought up at a special meeting of the Council called for the purpose.

Hon. Mr. Gordon said that in looking over the Act he found that no post could be placed without consent of the City Surveyor. He thought it a hardship for any company to be compelled to remove posts after being permitted to place them. If the posts have been placed by the order of the City Council or the Surveyor and a removal is desired the city should bear the cost.

Hon. Mr. Rogers thought that the rights of the city have been pretty well guarded especially with regard to the City Council. Both the city and the companies have property rights and the Bill proposes to place the control of one in the power of the other. Under the provisions of the Bill power is given to run the wires under ground or to remove them altogether.

The imposing of a tax upon the Chinese was just what Paul Kruger was doing in South Africa. The Chinese were other laundries, why not tax them?

Dr. Douglas thought that the city should have control of all companies. He contended that possibly there were too many bills of incorporation. The City Council is composed of private citizens

who get no remuneration while the companies are making a revenue.

Mr. Hughes contended under the existing conditions it is impossible to place a perfect system of fire alarm. In some places it is not possible to drive a load of hay under the wires. The people of Charlottetown do not wish to drive the electric light and telephone companies from doing business. The telephone company is exempt from taxation. He claimed that the city should be made as attractive as possible in order to induce tourists to come to the Province. Unsightly posts are one of the things avoided by all modern cities.

Captain Read said that the way the bill is drafted the passing of the measure would be a grave injustice. He was not particular about the Electric Light Co., but the telephone system reaches all parts of the country and if too much is asked they will not be able to extend their system throughout the country districts.

Mr. Read referred at length to the great need of a telephone at Kinkora and contended the company should comply with the request.

Mr. McLean thought the city had a grievance but considered that the bill went too far. He had no doubt a modification of the measure would meet with the wishes of the presenters.

Hon. Mr. Richards said that it is possible there is something needed in the shape of an amendment to the original act. The bill asks for the removing of the wires. He thought it was too sweeping an order under the bill the City could demand the

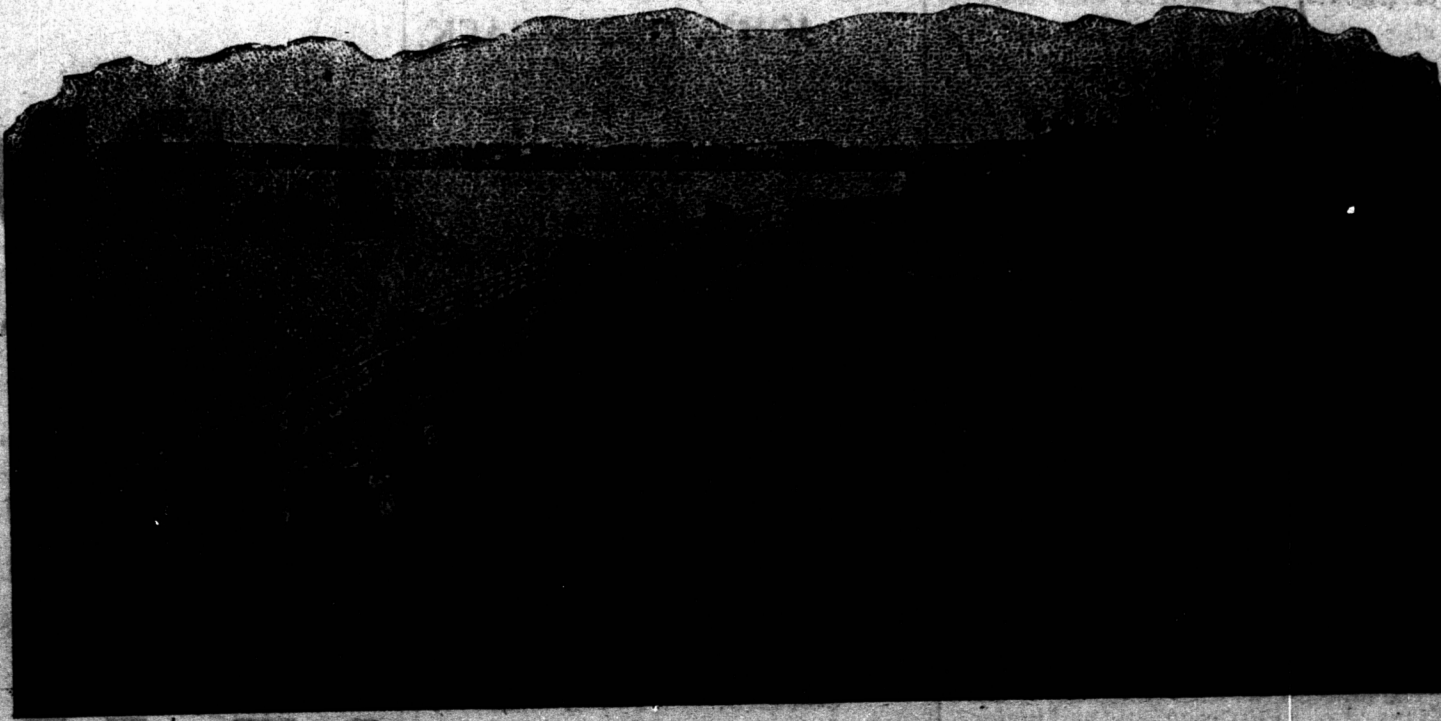
