Russians Demand Admission To Conference

LAUSANNE, Nov. 27.—The Russian delegation to the Near East conference sent a communication to the president of the conference today, demanding the admission of the Russian representatives to the discussion of all questions on the agenda so that a durable peace might be signed. Lord Curzon, the British Foreign Secretary, today authorized an official statement to the press that Great Britain supports the United States' "open door" policy in Turkey, and regards the San Remo agreement for division of the Mosul oil district as null and void.

Canadian Seigneur Safely In Port At St. John's

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Nov. 27.—After being buffeted about in a disabled condition by the storms of the North Atlantic for almost a month the Canadian government Seigneur is at last safely in port, having been towed here by the Canadian Sapper. Repairs to the Seigneur will occupy several weeks and it may be necessary to discharge her coal cargo before she goes in dock. The Seigneur left Liverpool for Montreal, October 25th, laden with four thousand tons of coal and one thousand tons of pig iron. Very stormy weather was experienced when the ship was six days out. She was swept by great seas which piled in on her by an easterly gale, and on October 31st when 740 miles north east of Belle Isle her rudder was carried away. News of the ship's condition was broadcasted and for two days and two nights unceasing attempts were made by the officers and crew to prepare and ship a jury rudder. Their efforts were nullified by an unceasing tempest. For seven days the ship drifted helplessly until on Nov. 7th the Newfoundland steamer Meigle arrived on the scene. Passing her way from one ship to the other was exceedingly risky and difficult but was at last accomplished. It was discovered that the rowing gear could not stand the strain and that the Meigle was too light a ship to tow the Seigneur. On November 10th the Canadian Sapper arrived and put her lines aboard and the tow to the part began in earnest. From that time until the two ships arrived here high winds blowing from almost every point of the compass and tremendously high seas were experienced and almost every other day broke the heaviest hawsers. On one occasion the tow lines had to be cut and the ships were forced to lay to all night. On Wednesday last the ships were again separated for several hours by thick weather and mountainous seas. Day by day, however, a few miles of progress were made until their arrival here.

Chinaman Murdered Three Countrymen

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Nov. 27.—We Fen Game, local Chinese laundress, was found guilty of murder yesterday by a special jury of the Supreme Court and was sentenced to death at a date to be set by the executive council. On May 25 last, Wo Fen Game, run amuck for some reason that has never been fully explained. He shot up three fellow countrymen in the Murray Street laundry where he was himself employed and then hustled across the city to Casey Street, where he shot a fourth Chinaman and seriously wounded himself. Three of the Chinamen taken this morning before he was taken to court Wo Fen Game, in some manner got possession of a brick with which he violently assaulted Warden Rose of the Penitentiary. The warden was badly cut about the head, and was knocked insensible. He is now in hospital in somewhat serious condition.

Braves and squaws alike are spending the evening hours listening to the latest "jazz" records on the phonographs, which have found their way into a new field. One or two player pianos sold by enterprising salesmen have added to the melody with which the reserve is now flooded, and several of the Indians have invested in automobiles. The city streets in the afternoon are well filled with Indian men and women who step out proudly in their newly discovered prosperity. The women flaunt their latest colors in dresses and wraps, and the men folk do not trouble to remove the bands of expensive cigars, which seem to be very popular with them. There is \$100,000 held in reserve by the Department of Indian Affairs which cannot be spent however.

Drowning And Fire At Twillingate, Nfld.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Nov. 27.—A message from Twillingate states that Robert Lambert of that place was drowned in the harbor just off his home Saturday morning. The store of E. Roberts & Co., of Twillingate with all its stocks of drygoods and groceries has been destroyed by fire.

Paris Arrested At Sydney, N. S.

SYDNEY, N. S., Nov. 27.—John Paris, colored, of Truro, who was arrested here last night, has been turned loose by the city police to earn his fine by lecturing upon his experiences during his five trials at St. John, N. B., for the murder of little Sadie McAulay Paris left Sydney in a hurry in May, 1919, after being convicted of carrying a revolver without permit and ordered to pay a fine of \$25 or serve two months. Hearing that he had arrived in town the police dug up the old commitment warrant and apprehended Paris a few minutes after he had received a warm welcome to the coke oven, the negro section of Sydney, where he will lecture tonight.

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Marburn Opens The Winter Port Season At St. John

ST. JOHN, N. B., Nov. 27.—The final touch was added this morning to the opening of the winter port season in St. John when the C.P.R. liner Marburn, the first passenger steamer of the 1922-23 season docked on the west side, the Marburn formerly the Tansian, making her first voyage under her new name left Liverpool on Friday, November 17, and Glasgow on the following day. The Marburn carried 47 cabin and 173 third class passengers in addition to a fair sized general cargo and the usual consignment of mail and parcel post matter. The passengers for the west left on a special train at 11:35 o'clock.

Mannequins To Be Trained

PARIS, Nov. 27.—So many French families of all grades of society are now living in straitened circumstances that women members have been obliged to seek means to supplement their incomes, a fact which has led to the invasion of the dressmaking houses by candidates for posts as mannequins—and the discovery that more than mere desire is necessary in order to make a good mannequin. Women lacking the special knowledge required to fill majority of the jobs often apply for the posts as mannequins because they fondly believe they possess an ideal elegant figure which an intelligent couturier will not fail to employ in order to show his designs to the very best advantage. Daily dressmakers receive applications from "petites bourgeoisie" and society women offering their services. All appear to think that it is sufficient to be slim and tall in order to show the dresses well. But experience has shown that this is not the case. Paul Poiret for instance, when asked whether an apprenticeship was essential for mannequins, replied: "You certainly cannot improvise and for my part, despite many offers I would not confide a job to show my dresses to any but experienced hands. Society women are impossible for employment. Having been used to wear pretty frocks according to their own personality they can never learn to show off models like professionals who possess the real 'mannequin style'." Generally speaking, mannequins are recruited in the same circles as conservatoire musical students. Six months' apprenticeship at least is in order to study correct bearing, manner of walking and conventional gestures, but, of course, natural born aptitude is essential, namely, an instinctive feeling for what is really elegant and chic. The most difficult test is that of displaying evening mantles and décolleté gowns. There are girls to whom it can say after a few weeks' trial: "You will never possess beautiful things because you don't know how to wear them."

Visc. Allenby's Mother Dead

LONDON, Nov. 27.—Marshal Viscount Allenby's mother, Mrs. Catherine Ann Allenby, died yesterday at Felkstone House, Felkstone, in her 92nd year. The daughter of the Rev. T. C. Cane, of Brackenhurst, Southwell Nottinghamshire, she was married in 1861, to Mr. Hymman Allenby, of Felkstone House. He belonged to a Lincolnshire family of landed gentry, whose name was originally spelled Albanby, which form is retained by the Scottish branch. In addition to Lord Allenby, she leaves another son, Captain Frederick Claude Hymman Allenby, R. N., C. B. E., who is in remainder to the peerage of his brother, whose only son was killed in the war.
