THE GUARDIAN is informed that a profitable business in wheat could be worked up here if marketed in the Fall, and a firm in Summerside is ready to buy considerable this season, if the farmers will place good wheat upon the market at a reasonable price, in order to give it a proper test in other markets. An authority says that "if we intend to grow wheat for export and build up (instead of destroying) our trade in that direction, it will be absolutely necessary to market our wheat in the fall so that it can be milled and go into consumption during the cold weather, as almost in every case—we are sorry to say—where our Island wheat was milled during the spring and summer months serious losses have been made by both d. alers and millers to such an extent, that our wheat will soon be refused by both, hence the great necessity of marketing in the fall, when it weight 5 per cent. more; and besides, interest and risk are considerable items."

The Pan-American edition of the St. Paul's Despatch contains the following reference to Mr. Charles S. Schurman, a member of the Minnesota Legislature. Mr. Schurman is the half brother of Mr. Thos. Schurman just east of Summerside. "Chas. S. Schurman represents the 35th district (6th ward) the honors fairly won by the importance of his services to his constituency. He was the author of the measure transferring the Broadway Bridge Fund and repair Fund, thus making possible the re-construction of the Wabasha Bridge. He pushed the bill increasing the school museums of St. Paul and fathered a number of other bills of a reform nature. Mr. Schurman was born and grew to manhood in P. E. I. He came to St. Paul in 1882 and for several years pursued his calling as a printer in the Pioneer Press office, where he was for a time assistant superintendent. In 1890 he bought the West St. Paul Times, changed its politics and from Democratic to Republican and has continued it since. He is a popular member of the Masons, of the Knights of Pythias, the Oddfellows and the A. O. U. W., also of the Foresters, whose official organ, the United Forester, he edits. He is married, owns his own home in West St. Paul's and has other investments. The despatch also contains a resembling out of Mr. Schurman.
