OTTAWA, March 16.—Eggs—
Production has shown an increase
in prices in all part of Canada, in
Ontario and Quebec this increase
is rather slow as yet but through-
out the West production is becom-
ing quite heavy. Toronto, the un-
derstone is weaker today with the
trade anticipating increase in re-
ceipts any time now. Wholesale
shippers, extras 39 to 40, firsts 35
to 36, seconds 30 to 31.

Montreal, wholesale fresh ex-
tras 40 to 41, firsts 34 to 35, sec-
onds 30 to 31, improved demand de-
veloped in frozen chickens yester-
day and trading was fairly active.

Winnipeg: Receipts are increas-
ing, market is lower, wholesale
fresh extras 38, firsts 35, seconds
25.

Saskatchewan, fresh receipts are
increasing rapidly and as a result
the market took a further drop over
the week end. Country dealers
are making sales, extras 24, firsts
22, seconds 16, wholesale fresh ex-
tras 28 to 34, firsts 26 to 30, sec-
onds 20 to 26.

Vancouver market is steady,
wholesale fresh extras 30, firsts
28, seconds 23.

Charlottetown, P. E. I. Receipts
show a slight increase market is
active, wholesalers paying coun-
try extras 30, firsts 27, seconds
23, jobbing extras 37,
firsts 34, seconds 28.

time we had a Membership of over
one thousand in Prince Edward
Island, so it would seem that at
least one half that number should
be attainable, provided we had the
support of a live and energetic
Executive Committee.
