True Bill In Hustler Case At S' side

A true bill was brought in to the Supreme Court at Summerside yesterday in the case of Merritt Leslie Hustler of Ebsfleet, charged with causing previous bodily harm. His trial will commence this morning at 11 o'clock. Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell presided at the opening day of the fall term.

In addressing the Grand Jury he said that the Sheriff's report indicated that there had not been any volume of serious crime in the County since the last term. He told them that there was only one criminal charge before them and said it was unfortunate that a case of this kind should mar the otherwise creditable record of the County. He reviewed the evidence of the case and instructed them as to whatever other duties they should perform.

There were no other cases on the docket but the Court allowed costs of \$10 to the respondent in the case of King vs. Wilfred Laviolette, which was an appeal from an Excise and Prohibition conviction which had been abandoned by the appellant.

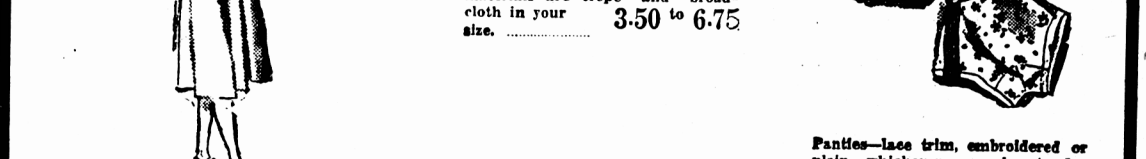

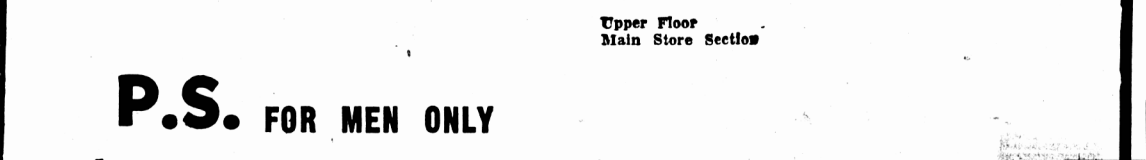

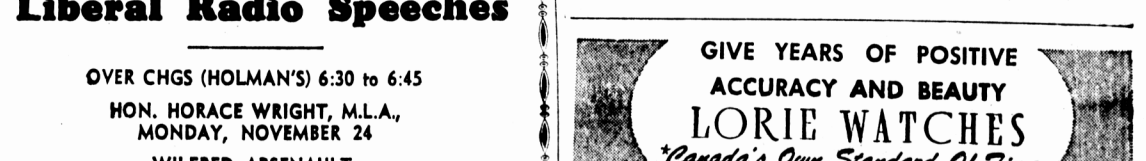

We inspected the gaol and grounds and building, and found everything in good condition. In connection with general law enforcement, we would recommend that whenever possible the R. C. M.
