The market for standard grades of rolled oats continued inactive but undertone was steady. The movement of baled hay to Great Britain and the United States continued good but a moderate amount of business was worked in eggs and the feeling was firm. Fresh extras were quoted at 37 to 38 c. and firsts at 32 c. per dozen. The receipts were 1,497 cases. A stronger developed in the butter market and prices were marked up 1/2c. per pound. No. 1 pasteurized creamery was quoted at 32 1/2c. to 33 per pound. The receipts were 7,002 packages. Considerable export business was transacted in cheese and prices on spot were steady. Western grades were quoted at 16 1/2c. to 17 per pound. The volume of business transacted in beans was small with car lots of choice white handpicked at \$2.25 to \$2.35 to \$2.45 per bushel.

### FARMING DEPENDS ON WEATHER
