FRANCIS GOTELL

Unfortunately he was disappointed in his quest, and his experience was upon his mind that he became broken down in health and spirit. The late Mr. Gotell was an industrious, thrifty man and an excellent citizen. He leaves a widow and the following family to mourn: three sons, Henry, Fred and Peter and two daughters, Mrs. W. S. Easton and Mrs. Simon King in Georgetown, and five daughters in the United States, viz:—Mrs. Fairweather, Mrs. Horace Eaton, Mrs. Mahar and Mrs. Miatt, all in Gloucester, Mass. and Mrs. LeBlanc in Attleboro, Mass. He had 53 grandchildren and 3 great grand children. The funeral took place yesterday morning to the Catholic cemetery in Georgetown.
