ference of the meeting in the Borden and Mathieson Governments, and especially appreciating the invaluable results which had attended the Mathieson administration for the advancement of the Province.
In putting the motion, Mr Brown stated that, whatever personal griev-

ance he might entertain, he could not help admitting that he was forced to the conclusion that the present local Government was, beyond the slightest question, by far the most progressive, and, in every sense of the word, the best government that had ever administered the affairs of this province, in all his experience of public matters extending over 37 years. He referred to the admirable efforts of the delegation, consisting of Messrs Mathieson, Arsenault and Stewart, which had succeeded in securing the subsidy of \$100,000 for the Island. The Government had vastly improved the condition of the farmers and had brought education up to such a standard that to-day one could hardly induce a teacher to leave the province.
Mr L. P. Tanton seconded the resolution, which was unanimously carried by a standing vote.
Premier Mathieson then in a few remarks thanked the meeting for the resolution. He was pleased at the note which had been struck by the mover and seconder of the resolution. He believed that everyone would go home full of pride and satisfaction at what had been done for the province by the Borden Government. They had in the province opportunities for development and advancement such as they never had before. Always they had had the dark cloud of debt hang-

STATEMENTS MADE BY BERNHARDI REFUTED.

PARIS, March 25.—French ministry of war issued last night a statement designed to refute assertions made in American newspapers by the German military authority, General Frederich Von Bernhardi, to the effect that the French plan of concentration shown that the French and British governments had made careful preparations to violate the neutrality of Belgium.
The war ministry's statement explains in detail that when war was declared the French army was concentrated along the German frontier and that the Teutonic invasion of Belgium compelled the general staff to charge completely the disposition which had been arranged. But for this delay, it says, the Germans never would have been able to cross the Meuse.

The question of the British army taking the field was not considered, the war ministry asserts, until after the violation of Belgium on August 5. Its concentration was effected behind Maubeuge from August 14 to 24. Various orders are quoted to show that the French army was kept six miles from the frontier and ordered to leave to the Germans the responsibility for opening hostilities.

An order issued by minister of war on August 4 is quoted as reading:—"Germany will attempt by false news to induce us to violate Belgian neutrality. It is strictly forbidden until further orders for patrols or even single scouts to cross the line or for

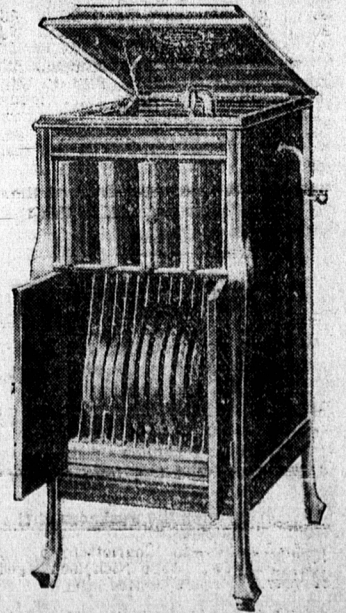

aviators to fly over Belgian territory." Not until August 5, the statement asserts, at the formal request of the Belgian government made the preceding day, did the French troops enter Belgium.
