The scarcity of oats in the Canadian West particularly and all over the Dominion as well is a matter which has taken an important position and efforts are now being put forward to the relief of the situation which has become so serious that, according to Guy Johnstone, travelling freight agent of the C. P. R. 150,000 bushels of oats were recently shipped from Prince Edward Island to the Canadian West. Such is an unusual state of affairs. Oats in New Brunswick are selling at high prices and good ones are scarce. In the west the situation is even worse and the Dominion Government are offering \$1 per bushel for the best oats for shipment to the west for seeding purposes. The scarcity of oats in the west for milling purposes has affected the price of oatmeal which has gone up about 50 cents per barrel and is quoted today at \$7.25 retail.
