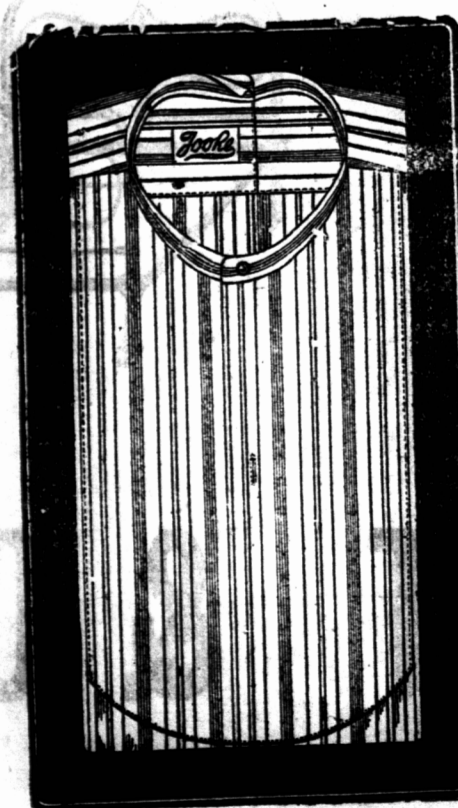

A number of Scott Act cases were up before the Stipe diary on Tuesday, but owing to the want of evidence they were dismissed.

Jas. B. Champion, a former resident of our town, but now of Oval, Worcester, Mass. was here a few days last week. He left for home on Monday.

James B. Mountain of Alma has a fine colt fourteen months old, weighing 1025 lbs. It is pronounced a beauty by many who have already called to see it.

The fishing craft Western King, owned by Wallace Richards, is being rebuilt, with the exception of keel and deck she will be entirely new when complete.

Capt. P. J. Conroy, arrived in port on Wednesday with the scr. Martha A. Bradley, which he has just purchased at Portland, Me. She is a craft of about 75 tons.

The bridge at Mill River known as the Meggison Bridge has been repaired by Andrew Martin of Bloomfield. The bridge at Huntley is likewise undergoing repairs.

Judge A. B. Warburton, of Charlottetown, was here on Monday. He went to Tignish in the evening to be present at Tuesday's session of the Teacher's Convention.

Miss Maria Travers, daughter of Thaddeus Travers, Kildare Cape, left for Worcester, Mass. on Monday, where a lucrative position awaits her in one of the city hospitals.

After placing the steel buoy at the entrance of the harbor on Saturday, the steamer Brant went north. She will return about the 10th of July with supplies for the harbor lights.

Hillard Muttart, who at present is in the employ of Sinclair & Stewart, Summerside, intends leaving on Wednesday for the North West. He expects to be absent about two months.

Ser. "Stanley Mac," Capt Whittle, was in port on Monday with coal for J. E. Myrick & Co. She sailed for Chatham, N. B., on Tuesday. The scr. Vivian, Capt Gorcin, is also in port, and is loading coal on cars for Tignish.

The lobster fishermen along the north shore have begun to take in their gear, and some packers are about closing down after a good season's work. Cod fish at present seem quite plentiful, but mackerel are scarce.

The town was unusually quiet on Dominion Day. Flags were floated to the breeze from the staffs of Rev. A. E. Burke, Wm. Hunter, B. Rogers, and the Post Office. Citizens in general vacated the town and Tom Kee went fishing.

John Gallant (Jesse) of Piusville was killed at Ramford Falls, Maine, on Friday last. While crossing an electric car track his foot got caught in some way, and before he had time to extricate it, he was struck by a car and instantly killed. The remains were brought home and interred in the R. C. Cemetery at Bloomfield.
