ILLAND, TERESA WRIGHT CO-STAR WITH BRIAN DONLEVY AT CAPITAL, SUMMERSIDE

In "The Trouble With Women," stars Ray Milland, Teresa Wright and Brian Donlevy attempt, in reportedly hilarious fashion, to shed some light on the vexing unknown quantity that is Woman, and out of their research emerges a film that is said to provide an abundance of laughs in its searching answer to the question.

For Milland and Miss Wright, "The Trouble With Women" is a complete switch from the dramatic portrayals for which both are renowned and which have already won them the coveted Academy Award. Ray, in his long and distinguished career, has done comedy before, but this is Teresa's first attempt at a laugh-provoking role.

Advance reports indicate that they are a peach of a pair of partners in fun.

The film, set against the backgrounds of a newspaper office and a college campus, casts Milland as a learned professor of psychology whose theory about love and women is just a theory, and not first hand information. SIDE BOARD

Of Trade Holds Monthly Meeting

At the regular meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade held last night in the Town Hall, it was decided to hold the annual meeting and banquet on Tuesday, January 27th, at Leo Goble's Olympia Restaurant.

The meeting was one of the most largely attended during the year and was presided over by the president W.M. Mellish.

The President announced that negotiations were now under way by which arrangements may possibly be made to bring a regular shunter for Summerside. The Summerside Board of Trade has, for a period of years, been endeavoring to have the Canadian National Railways provide this service but up to the present has been unable to bring the matter to a satisfactory conclusion.

Mr. John E. Campbell, chairman of the Marine Committee and who is in charge of the Marine Wharf reviewed the history of these attempts and pointed out that during the past year about 80,000 bushels of potatoes had been shipped from the wharf. Not one carload of these had come by rail. All had been brought in by truck and Mr. Campbell stated that the resulting congestion was very great.

Although the Canadian National Railways had decided years ago to abandon the Marine Wharf, and it had subsequently been taken over by the Department of Transport the railway continued to use the wharf. Mr. Campbell believed that if a shunter were supplied to Summerside this condition of congestion would be eliminated.

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RAISES DAM PROJECT
