No Military Objectives Hit. "Bombs also were dropped on land, but military objectives being hit but one civilian was killed and seven wounded, including two women in the village of Bridge of Waith and five cottages were damaged."

First Raid Since October. It was the first air raid on Scapa Flow since last Oct. 17 when the Iron Duke, the demilitarized battleship used as a training ship, was damaged.
