### THE RUSSIAN DOUMA.

The burning question in Russia since the defeat of the revolutionaries, is whether the Government will continue the present repressive policy, or carry out in good faith the promised reforms, giving reasonable freedom of discussion, agitation, meeting and representation in the National Assembly or Douma. There has been and is much popular distrust. Some have said the Douma will never meet at all; others fear that if it does meet at last it will have no real power, while others still believe that the Government by unfair police methods and restrictions will disfranchise most of its opponents and capture the Douma so that instead of reform legislation it will enact only measures agreeable to the bureaucracy.

The Government on its part has promised that the Douma shall be elected early in April and assemble before the close of that month, always provided that no new strikes, disorders or insurrections shall take place in the meantime. The qualification seems not unreasonable. A nation in revolution could not properly conduct an election. Moreover the decision that the election can only take place after order is restored offers a powerful incentive to the maintenance of order. Popular opinion is divided. Among a people who have long suffered every form of oppression and injustice there are many who know little of the value of representative institutions and are therefore indifferent to the election.

The registration of voters has so far been very light. Some believe it useless to register and others fear to register. The fear is largely prevalent among the large Jewish population, who are eager for civil rights; but distrustful lest some new pretext be found against them. The leading newspapers of St. Petersburg, however, urge the people to register and prepare for the election. Gorky's Radical organ, the Nascha Zinn, the Novosti, the Novoe Vremya, the Slovo and other journals, representing as many different shades of opinion, all point to this course, to take part in the election and make the most of the privilege of voting. "The danger now is indifference," says Gorky. If no new disorders arise, and this seems now to be the probable course of events, the election will be held, with but a fraction of the qualified electors taking part, and the Douma will meet in due time. What its completion will be remains to be seen.

The St. John Sun refers to Father Burke of Alberton as an all-round man, an able champion of the Tunnel, a successful farmer and energetic head of the Fruit-Growers' Association, now become head of the Provincial Temperance Alliance. The Sun adds that this is said to mean that the Alliance "will be a vigorous machine". We do not doubt that under its new and very energetic President the Alliance will give the best possible account of itself.

It has been the misfortune of many a good man not to be born on Prince Edward Island. Sir John Macdonald was not born in Canada, but Canada honored him. J. G. Schurman was not born in the United States but the Republic has honored him greatly. Thus Canada got a man from abroad and gave a man away. How many thousands of instances there have been of this kind. It is childish to object in our civic election that this or that candidate was not born in the City. The true estimate is based upon what the man is in himself, what he has done and purposes to do. It would only be a one-horse town which would bar the way to the preferment of worthy men simply because they were born in another land.
