THE BRITISH MARKET.

Canada Supplies Nearly Half the Cheese Imported into Britain.

HALIFAX, February 13.—Professor Robertson, in his report to the government, speaking of the extent of the British market, says the British are good consumers for food products. "As I have already pointed out," he goes on to say, "they are discriminating buyers. For the best qualities of all kinds of foods in the peak of fine condition, there is usually a steady demand at relatively high prices. And for the same kind of food of an inferior quality and out of condition, the prices are ruinously low, and even at them the demand is uncertain. The following statement shows the demand in Great Britain for such food products as Canada can supply of fine quality and in ever increasing quantity.
