DRAW FOR MACDONALD-BRIER TROPHY

Eight Rinks Gather In Toronto to Compete For Dominion Curling Honors.

(C. F. By Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, March 4.—Two of the most feared entries in the Macdonald-Brier trophy matches for the curling championship of Canada—Gordon Campbell's Hamilton team, representing Ontario, and the Manitoba defender, the Killarney quartette skippered by Roy T. Pritchard—have been brought together in initial competitions by the chance of the draw. They will meet tomorrow morning.

Other morning matches tomorrow will see Nick Thibodeau's New Brunswick standard-bearers from Bathurst opposed to the Quebec four led by W. G. McGeerrie of Ormstown and Charles Durand's Halifax rink from the Mayflower Curling Club battling for Nova Scotia against Saskatchewan's entry from the Nutana Curling Club, Saskatoon, skippered by Jimmy Black. Since the first year, 1927, when Nova Scotia took first place, the best rinks from that province have been able to do so four times. In 1930 and 1932 three rinks finished ahead of them.

Nick Thibodeau is another skip appearing for the third time and has a good record. In 1931 he gave that year's title winners, Bob Gourley's Winnipeg crew, their only defeat. The next year he lost four games but three of them were by single points and the rinks that need him out finished first, second and third.

The eight competing rinks arrived here today and some of them took part in practice games to get the feel of the ice.

Junior Champs May Tour British Isles

(C. F. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, March 4.—Plans are practically completed for the winners of the Memorial Cup, emblematic of the Dominion Junior Hockey Championship to play a series of games in the United Kingdom. It was announced today by Cecil Duncan, Vice-president of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association. Duncan said devotees of the game in England were anxious to have either the senior or junior champions make the trip. As next year's Olympic year and the new Canadian senior winners are scheduled to play in Germany, it appeared more than likely that the juniors would journey to the British Isles at the close of the present amateur hockey season.

If present plans materialise, the winners of the Memorial Cup will leave Canada about April 7. They will play a series of 10 games in the United Kingdom, and return to Canada some time in May.

Final arrangements now await the sanction of the C. A. H. A., it was said.

INTERMEDIATES BOAST PLENTY HOCKEY TALENT

Enviably Record Chalked Up By Local Team In Reaching Finals.

That the Intermediate Abbies boast plenty of hockey ability and experience in their lineup is quite apparent when one glances over the names of the players below.

Led by a veteran the team has compiled an enviable record this past season losing only two games and that in the playoffs against Summerside. In all others they piled up substantial margins and seemed to be always in command. Their showing is all the more remarkable when one considers that the team lost several stars to the senior squad during the season only to have the recruits come along fast under the guidance of Coach Percy Rodd and Manager Ian McKenry. These two ardent hockey men deserving a lot of the credit that is today being bestowed upon the team.

THE TEAM

Watson McEwen; goal. For several years past for the seniors in the Island Senior League and after a lay off of three years has made a remarkable comeback this season, his work being outstanding.

Murray Carmichael; defence. Rugged, heavy hitting youngster. Started hockey career with Levin Fours, 1930, the team capturing the Junior Maritime title, graduating to the Intermediate ranks in 1932 and this year gives promise of developing into a real performer.

Roy Prowse; defence. The veteran and spark-plug of the team. Started hockey career many years ago performing with Abbies when Maritime champions. Later played professional hockey in Regina and this year after getting amateur card back, has made a comeback that has surprised his most ardent followers. Roy's experience has pulled the team through many a tough spot while he also is well up in the scoring lists.

Freddie Bradley; Better known as Wes, after two years in junior ranks graduated to the Intermediates last season with the Navy team. Signed by the Abbies this year, he has come along well and is another player who enjoys a rugged type of game.

Frank Acorn; centre, a veteran in hockey service although young in years. Frank was a member of the senior Abbies for several years while they were performing in the Island League. Since then he has been playing intermediate. A fast skater, he is a tricky stickhandler and possesses a hard shot, a fact that has opened many a goal.

G. Stewart; left wing, just out of junior ranks this year after three seasons. Performed last year with Abbies, Maritime-Quebec champions. A fast skater, Gordon is also a persistent backchecker, and while on the attack is a hard man to handle at the defence line.

Freddie Bradley; right wing, the fastest skater on the team and one of the fastest in the province. Fred has seen senior service on several occasions and is a prolific scorer. He is a tireless backchecker but this does not prevent him from being among the high scorers on the team, his speed carrying him in on exciting goalies many times during a game.

Pete Weir; centre, the youngest of the team. Breaking into organized hockey for the first time this year, Pete has shown ability to mix it with the biggest while his stickhandling is a treat to watch.

Keith Acorn; right wing, another speed merchant. Received his start in junior hockey and has played with the intermediates ever since. Displays a boring-in style that is effective in a goal-scoring way while he can also turn in a smart performance behind the bluelines.

Tom McCabe; left wing, another former member of the Junior Levin Fours. This boy when going right is one of the trickiest players on the team. A good puck-carrier Roy has proved his worth on several occasions, coming through in the pinches with much-needed goals.

THE PROPOSED tour of the British Isles by this year's Dominion Junior champions should add a lot of incentive to those competing for the Memorial Cup this year. The juniors always provide the utmost in action, but should the above become a reality those in the running would probably stage an even greater series for the right to represent the Dominion in a good will tour through the United Kingdom.

BUNCHED FOR SCORING HONOURS

Detroit Red Wing Snipers Press Hard In United States Section of League.

MCINTIREAL, March 4.—Detroit Red Wings, the team that doesn't know when it's beaten, picked up ten goals and two victories in the past week with the result its sharpshooters are pressing hard on the heels of Frank Boucher, centre of New York Rangers, for scoring leadership of the National Hockey League's United States section.

Johnny Sorrell, Detroit winger made the best individual showing with five scoring points during the week while Larry Aurie is but a point behind Boucher with 18 goals, 23 assists, 38 points against Boucher's 10-29-39. Syd Howe, 18-21-37, and Herb Lewis, 12-33-38 hold the next positions for Detroit.

In the international section big Charlie Conacher, ace right winger of Toronto Maple Leafs, continues to pound along the goal getting trail widening his margin over all other marksmen. His 27-20-47 gave him a clear lead of eight points over anyone else while he has scored six more goals than Harvey Jackson, Toronto, and Cecil Dillon, Rangers, each with 21.

First year men are led by a wide margin by Dave Schirner of New York Americans who has 16 goals, 18 assists. Bert Connolly, ex-Moncton Hawk, has the best showing among first year men in the United States section, the Ranger forward having 9-10-19.
