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Newsman Met Many Maritimers

SOMEWHERE IN BRITAIN, October (By Air Mail) — (Delayed) — Among other things, the Dieppe raid clearly demonstrated that the Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps is ready to do the job assigned it to care for our wounded, restore them to health and generally keep all troops fit for active service. Casualties from Dieppe were rushed at once to our military hospitals after they were landed at various south England ports. In a few cases it was simpler to put them in closer British hospitals but they were moved when possible to our own. Our party was taken to a typical General Hospital as run by the R.C.A.M.C. where 221 wounded from the Dieppe show had been taken. All of those to whom I spoke expressed satisfaction with the care given them and the attention they received.

The hospital is a semi-permanent structure, now being enlarged by Canadian engineers, and covers a large area of ground situated in a rural district as far away as possible from enemy bombers. While the institution is known as the C. G. H. from Toronto, I found its Maritime make-up in nurses and medical staff was the head matron, Mary Shaffner, and 12 of the eight nursing sisters are down-easters. Nursing Sister E. C. Purdy, daughter of J. T. Purdy, M. P., Truro, was assigned to take me around to visit the numerous Maritimers and she hustled me along with such efficiency that I was able to have a short chat with all except a few who were able to walk out to lunch, despite the short time put at the disposal of our party.

Many Maritimers were Dieppe wounded. With the Army Service Corps, Pte. E. Labelle Campbellton, had stopped a piece of shrapnel while on the beach. On this side the past eight months, he said he would soon be ready for more rest fighting and hoped he wouldn't have to wait so long for action the next time. A former Cape North, C.B., native, Pte. G. J. Burton was also recovering from a shrapnel wound received while serving with the Winnipeg Cameron Highlanders. A couple of the lads were particularly cheerful about the injuries serious enough to warrant their getting home to Canada for a rest. E. A. Friars of the P.E. Light Horse was in this class. He had been sitting on the back seat of a parked jeep when a civilian car struck his hand, smashing it badly. Pte. J. J. MacLeod, New Waterford man with the Cape Breton Highlanders, broke his leg in an accident and infection, requiring a considerable rest period after he leaves hospital.

Three more of the boys were motorcycle victims. S. G. Hamilton, Saint John, G. Edinger, Jacques River, N. B. and Pte. C. L. Comeau, Weymouth; the latter had recovered from his injuries but was in again for further observation. Other accident cases included Pte. F. L. Munro, Clementsport, N.S., due to loss of the cast from a broken back the morning I saw him—he was hurt in a fall on staging and L. V. Jollymore, Amherst, in with a broken leg. Receiving surgical treatment were J. T. Bato, Dorchester, and A. W. Harper, Saint John, both recovering from appendix operations. Charles Morris, Tilly Road, N.B., tonsils removed; H. Durrall, Wicklow, N.B., J. C. Nickerson, Carleton, Yal. Co., and J. F. Muse, Yarmouth. Muse had had three operations but was getting out the next day and felt pretty happy about it.

I had only half a minute with each man but everywhere I found satisfaction. Not a man complained of lack of attention in treatment of food—although all hoped to be able to return to their units soon. Like all soldiers overseas, they asked for the usual cigarettes and still more news from home. Responsible in a large measure for the efficiency of the hospital were the Maritime nurses. I hadn't the time to meet most of them but I learned from Nursing Sister Purdy the names of several: Sally Turnbull and Mildred Tinsie, Saint John, Ethel MacKenzie, Pictou—she was on leave while our party was there—Bernice Baaloom, Annapolis, Ruth MacLean, Summerside, A. W. Foster, Berwick, Ruth MacLean, Charlottetown. One of the orderlies is Pte. R. J. Knightly, Halifax.

In the officers' mess afterwards, where we had luncheon, I found Capt. J. S. "Pep" Miller and Major C. Leslie Major of Halifax, administration officer and former secretary of the Royal N.S. 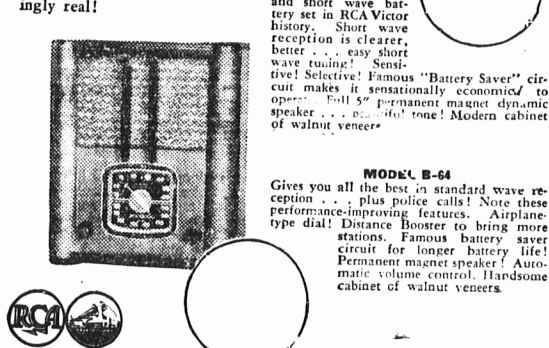
