THE COOK'S CORNER

BUTTER STRETCHER

One tablespoon plain gelatin, 1 pound good butter, 1-1/2 cups evaporated milk for 2 cups whole milk and about 1-2 teaspoon salt.

1-4 cup cold water. Soften the gelatin in the 1-4 cup cold water. Stand over hot water and stir until dissolved. Cut butter into small pieces and stir until butter is quite soft but not melted, or allow water to room temperature until very soft. Slowly whip the milk and dissolved gelatin in the butter with rotary beater or electric mixer. If you milk tends to separate a little keep on mixing until the gelatin works on the excess moisture. Pack into place in cold place to harden. It should be kept cold when not in use. If you wish to go to the trouble of yellow vegetable coloring may be added.

This may be used as a spreading for bread, toast, muffins, waffles, pancakes, etc., but not as shortening for cake or for frying.

DRIED BEEF AND ALMONDS

Mix 2 cups unsalted medium white sauce, 4 ounces shredded dried beef and 1-2 cup toasted, blanched almonds. Heat and serve and there you have a wonderful dish, something that tastes like a dish from an impressive restaurant.

If you have left-over cooked lamb place in a defensible lamb a la minute. Heat 2 cups medium white sauce, 2 cups cooked lamb and 1-2 cup salted almonds, and serve on biscuits.
