**27 Killed And 25 Injured In Train Wreck In Germany**

BERLIN, July 31.—Twenty-seven people were killed and twenty-five injured in a collision today between the Hamburg-Munich express and a stationary train at Kremsen station near Cassel.

**The Anonymous Letter Craze**

LONDON, July 31.—For the last three years Littlehampton has been annoyed and disgusted by a series of anonymous and indecent letters received by various men and women in the town. These letters have been the origin of a remarkable series of cases in the courts. It is now believed that the writer has at last been located and that conviction is certain. The woman who is now being prosecuted is Miss Edith Emily Swann, and one of the most popular features of the case is that she first prosecuted another woman, Mrs. Gooding, on a charge of writing libels against her. This history of the cases may be summed up as follows:

December, 1920, Mrs. Gooding sentenced to ten days imprisonment at Lewes assizes on a charge of writing libels against Miss Swann.

March, 1921, Mrs. Gooding again convicted on a charge of libelling Miss Swann and sentenced to 12 months imprisonment.

April, 1921, Mrs. Gooding's appeals dismissed.

July, 1921, Convictions against Mrs. Gooding quashed by Home Secretary, following police inquiry.

August, 1921, Treasury compensation grant of 1,250 dollars to Mrs. Gooding.

December, 1921, Miss Swann charged with libelling Mrs. Violet May, tried at Lewes assizes and acquitted.

July 10, 1923, Miss Swann committed for trial on two charges of attempting to publish and of publishing an obscene libel concerning charges of the Littlehampton Sanitary Inspector.

The Post Office authorities for over three years have been endeavoring to trace the sender of the anonymous letters. Finally they hit on an ingenious scheme. Suspecting Miss Swann they had six stamps marked with invisible ink placed in the Beach Post Office. On June 23 Miss Swann asked for stamps at this office. She was served from the special stock. On the following day she was seen to approach the letter box at the office. The tray at the bottom of the box was immediately emptied and Miss Swann dropped two letters in. One of these letters was addressed to a sister of the defendant and the other to the Sanitary Inspector. This envelope was opened and inside was found the letter containing the indecent words. Miss Swann was then asked to visit the Post Office and in her presence the invisible ink on the stamps was developed.

The Public Prosecutor in opening the case said "Such is the strength of the Crown's case that the effect of putting an end to what has been for some years past a public nuisance in Littlehampton," Miss Swann pleaded not guilty and was committed for trial.

**CANADIAN PACIFIC Farm Laborers Excursion via C. P. Railways**

The Canadian Pacific Railway will again run Farm Laborers' excursions to Western Canada this year on August 3rd and August 17th. The fare for the going journey will be \$20.00 from St. John and other points in the Province of New Brunswick on the line of the Canadian Pacific Railway. From points east of St. John also from points in Prince Edward Island the fares will be made up of the lowest one way second class up to St. John plus \$20.00 and war tax charge additional. For the return journey the fare will be \$25.00 from Winnipeg to St. John and other points in New Brunswick on the line of the Canadian Pacific Railway; and to points east of St. John and destinations in Prince Edward Island the lowest one way second class fare additional. Every person purchasing Farm Laborers' ticket will be furnished with what is called a "verification certificate" and this form when filled in at Winnipeg by a farmer to show that the holder has been hired to work in the harvest field will entitle the party to purchase ticket from Winnipeg to any point in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta (but not west of Edmonton, Calgary or McLeod) at the rate of one-half cent per mile with no less charge than five cents.

The Canadian Pacific will operate the required number of special trains from St. John, running direct to Winnipeg without change. Lunch counter cars will also be operated—foods and refreshments at reasonable prices.

Special accommodation on trains will be provided for ladies and families travelling together; and the Harvesters are assured of every comfort en route.
