# THE MINUTES OF THE PRESBYTERY

## Re-arranging West Cape Congregation--Campbellton and Other Sections to Be United--Other Congregations To Be Re-arranged

At West Cape and within the Presbyterian church there on Monday, the twentieth day of May, nineteen hundred and seven years, and at six o'clock p. m. the commission of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met at the call of the chairman, and was duly constituted with prayer by said chairman. Mr. T.F. Fullerton, with whom were present Messrs A. D. Stirling, M. H. McIntosh, George Millar, W. A. McKay, R. G. Strathie, Ministers, and Benjamin Rogers, Elder.

Mr. R. G. Strathie was appointed Secretary of the commission.

Mr. George Millar stated that he had cited the congregation of West Cape to appear and confer with the Commission as to the rearrangement of the bounds of the congregation.

Mr. McNeill appeared on behalf of Campbellton, and reported that the section of the congregation had passed a resolution in favor of the union of the Campbellton section with the congregation of Elmisdale, Moutrose and Tignish.

On motion of Mr. George Millar it was agreed by the Commission that the opinion of the congregation present be taken with regard to the rearrangement. Upon which Mr. Alex Morrison moved and Mr. Michael McDonald seconded that West Cape be united with Bloomfield to form one congregation comprising Bloomfield, O'Leary, Brae and West Cape. This motion was carried unanimously.

It was further moved that the minimum contribution of the West Cape section towards the minister's salary be two hundred dollars. Carried unanimously.

The Commission then adjourned to meet at O'Leary in the evening of which public intimation was made, and this adjournment closed with the benediction.

At O'Leary and within the Presbyterian Church the same day and date at eight-fifteen o'clock in the evening the Commission met and was constituted by prayer by Mr. A. D. Stirling at the call of the chairman. Sederunt as above.

The minutes of the afternoon session were read and approved.

Mr. W. A. McKay reported that he had cited the congregation of Bloomfield, O'Leary and Brae to be present, by the only means open to him, viz., by notification of the Elders, there being no preaching services where the citation could be publically read.

## EDITOR'S MAIL.

### THE COUNCIL AND THE LIBRARY

To the Editor of The Guardian.

I have read with much pleasure your article of yesterday morning in which you referred to the great progress that has been made by Prince Edward Island in recent years and especially by Charlottetown. I can myself attest to the latter for since I first visited this City it has been improved almost beyond belief.

But I was greatly surprised to see it stated in the papers that the City Council of this progressive community had refused a grant of \$3.0 to the Library, which is free to the people of this city. This, it is said, was done on the ground that the Library is maintained by the Province. But the Province is under no obligation to give Charlottetown a free library, which the City Council does not appear to value. The Library, under the admirable management of the present Librarian, is a credit to the Province and a great boon to the City. It is not surpassed by any Library in the Maritime Provinces, except that of St. John, N. B., which gives \$5,000 a year to its support. If the City of Charlottetown had to pay for its Library in the same proportion according to population, its contribution would be \$1,500 a year or five times what it has been asked to give. It is of course not proper for a stranger to criticise the conduct or impugn the motives of the City Council, yet I at least may be permitted to express the hope that, after fuller consideration the money will be granted.

Public Libraries are universally admitted to be among the most important means of spreading education and promoting the mental well-being of the people. It is to be regretted that the people of the Maritime Provinces have hitherto been so backward in the establishment of these useful institutions. To their neglect in this respect and in kindred matters must be largely attributed, the unwillingness of so many of our young people to remain with us. Nor can we blame them for wishing to improve their opportunities for the acquisition of knowledge and material advancement. Many of these people go to a foreign country and are forever lost to us. Every effort should be made to put a stop to this exodus. You have now a 20,000 Club which aims to double the population of this beautiful Island. This cannot be done by immigration but only by keeping your own people at home. If the 20,000 Club can only devise means to make this Province so attractive as to keep the young people here, the noble object they have in view will be realized in thirty years.
