On Tuesday at 3 o'clock p. m. there passed away at Northern Station one of the oldest and most respected residents of West Prince viz. Mrs. James Ellis, relict of the late James Ellis, who once carried on extensive ship building at Bileford. Mrs. Ellis was in the 90th year of her age, and retained all her faculties up to the time of her death. This remarkable old lady was noted for her kindness of heart, her sympathy for anyone in trouble and her aim always seemed to be to assist some one who really needed help. During the past few months she was confined to her bed and Drs. A. McDougall and Long attended her, but she gradually grew weaker and on Tuesday afternoon she passed peacefully away. She was well and favorably known all over West Prince. Robert Ellis, Postmaster at O'Leary is a son of the deceased and Mrs. Peter MacDougall of Moncton, N. B. is a daughter and several sons who are residents in the States survive her.

A correspondent sends further particulars of the death of the late Dr. Cahill:—Dr. Wm. H. Cahill, a dentist, who had offices in the Stearns building on Pratt St. died at 8:30 a. m. Aug. 15th, in St. Francis hospital, Hartford, Conn., of dysentery following an attack of acute uraemia. His death was sudden. An hour before he expired, his brother, E. P. Cahill visited him in response to an inquiry as to how he felt, the sick man replied: "Pretty good; in fact I am much better." For several months Dr. Cahill had confined himself closely to his business. About five weeks ago he had an attack of acute uraemia and dysentery attacked him. In compliance with the advice of his brother he went to St. Francis Hospital Saturday and Sunday and Monday he appeared to be improving. His sudden death caused a keen shock to relatives and a wide circle of friends and business acquaintances. Dr. Cahill was 41 years old and a son of the late Walter and Margaret Cahill, who were among the old settlers on Prince Edward Island. When a young man he attended schools at home and in N. B. Later on he went to Boston with his mother with whom he lived. He attended the Philadelphia Dental School from which he graduated. He came to Boston about ten years ago and succeeded in building up a splendid practise. Dr. Cahill is survived by five brothers E. P. Cahill and Dr. J. H. Cahill, Hartford; Walter of Kildare, Prince Edward Island; Philip and Francis of British Columbia; and five sisters the Misses Margaret and Elizabeth Cahill and Miss Mary Cahill of Hartford and Mrs. James Hogan of South Shore, Lot 65, Prince Edward Island and Sister Anastasia, St. Mary's Convent, Haverhill, Mass. The body was taken to Tignish where the mother of the deceased who died about three years ago is buried. E. P. Cahill accompanied the body, leaving Hartford at 2:30 Wednesday morning for Boston. 31d 3f

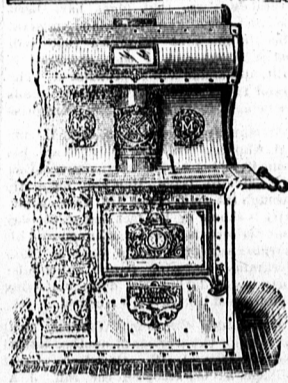
