## Saints Retain Island Football Crown With -0 Win Over R. A. F. Team

Pushing across a try in the first fifteen minutes of the opening half and then staving off the challenges of their opponents during the remainder of the game, Father Walter McGugan's S. D. U. rugby fifteen Saturday retained their Island football crown with a 0-0 draw against the R. A. F. team in the Island series. The first half touch-down was the only score of the first fifteen minutes of the game, but the R. A. F. team put up a spirited battle over a muddy field.

Saints kicked off to their opponents and for the first five minutes of the game play saw-sawed back and forth around the centre stripe. R. A. F. then had a little of the better of the game as they pressed determinedly but the first and only score of the game came like a bolt from the blue. From a lineup A. J. McAdam, captain and class forward of the university team shared the ball; 15 yards down field he raced before being tackled and then he heaved the oval to Willie McDonald who negotiated the rest of the distance to the line. Jack Murray's attempt at a convert from a difficult angle was a little wide of the posts. For the remainder of the half the two squads kept their unchanged lineups from the first game of the series, battled on even terms with neither goal line being in very much danger of being crossed.

In the first minute of the second half the Saints threatened seriously as they kicked and ran their way to the air force's 30 yard line. A penalty to the R. A. F. team relieved matters that saw the losers stage a march that took them to within 15 yards of the S. D. U. line only to have Saints stiffen their defence and hurl back the challenge. Willie McDonald was playing a great following game on the S. D. U. forward line and several times during the encounter dribbled the oval out of danger.

## Canadiens Smother Bruins Under 13-4 Score; Leafs Also Fall To Montrealers

MONTREAL, Nov. 21 (CP)— Montreal Canadiens bludgeoned Boston Bruins under a 13-4 count tonight to chalk up their eighth win in 10 National Hockey League games and keep their unbeaten record intact since the season's start.

A crowd of 12,469, a sell-out, saw Canadiens soundly trounce the only team that previously had held them to a tie, chalk up a modern scoring record for one team and combine with Bruins to come within a goal of equalling the modern goal record of 18.

The Bruins did a little record breaking themselves, the four shots they pushed past Bill Durnan being the greatest number to beat the Canadian net-minder this season.

The Bruins weren't as played as the scoring would indicate, but it was one of those nights when the Boston Club just couldn't get things to click at the crucial moments.

## Hamilton Navy Team Trowned By Halifax 18-1

HALIFAX, Nov. 21 (CP)— Sparked by fleet-footed Mike Hedgewick, former Hamilton Tiger Star, Halifax Navy crushed Toronto Navy 18-1 here Saturday, mounting a smashing offensive for three touchdowns in the final quarter. The win gave the Halifax team the Canadian Navy football championship, held by Toronto the past two years, and strengthened their claim to challenge the Grey Cup winners to an exhibition war charity game.

An estimated 4,000 people crowded the Navy League recreation centre to see the Halifax squad roll over the visitors in the last quarter after 45 minutes of sometimes ragged play that saw Toronto mounting a more polished attack in the early stages. Toronto, which finished fourth this year in the Ontario Rugby Football Union, had played 10 games before Saturday, while Halifax had played only once as a team when they beat Montreal Navy two weeks ago.

The Halifax team now is awaiting outcome of the Grey Cup final between Hamilton Wildcats and Winnipeg, western champions. The Navy team has agreed to play Halifax if they win the cup.
