

TORONTO, Apr. 8.—"You may search the weather records of Ontario for a couple of generations and not find a parallel to the extraordinary conditions of the past week-end," said an old timer today. Extreme heat, violent thunder storms and occasional cloudbursts that devastated communications characterized the three-days starting last Friday. At midnight Thursday the thermometer stood at 66 and it reached over 80 during the daytime. All this has started spring at a gallop. Meadows are verdant green and the woods are breaking into leaf. Spring is at least a fortnight ahead of the last few years.

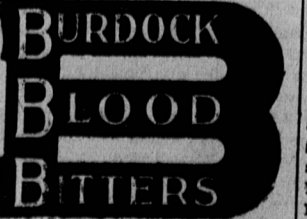
